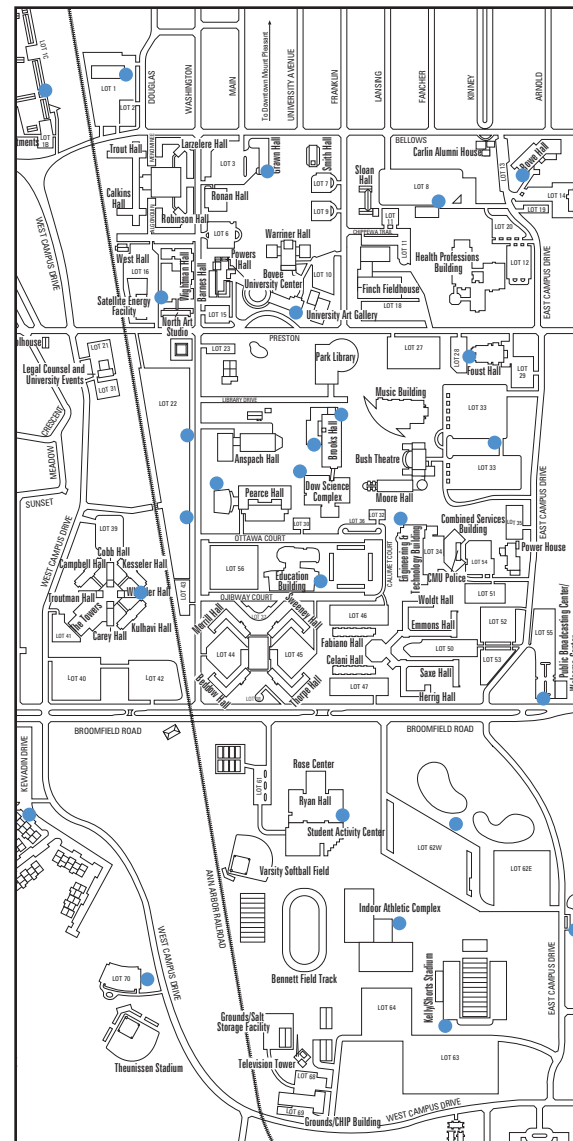

CMU Police Department

Central Michigan University is committed to maintaining a safe and secure campus environment. The university has established the CMU Police Department to assist with providing a safe campus. However, a safe and secure campus can be achieved only with the cooperation of all members of the university community. Students, employees and visitors are encouraged to be alert, take precautions, and report crimes and suspicious activities immediately.

The CMU Police Department handles reports and investigates crimes that occur on the main campus. The department consists of sworn police officers certified by the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards. CMU police officers receive police authority through Act 120 of Public Acts 1990. In addition, officers are sworn deputies under the authority of the Isabella County sheriff. The CMU Police Department has officers on duty 24 hours a day, seven days a week. In addition to the Isabella County Sheriff’s Department, CMU police work closely with the Michigan State Police, the Mount Pleasant Police Department, the Saginaw Chippewa Tribal Police and the Shepherd Police Department.

Reporting crimes or other suspicious behavior

On campus. When emergencies such as injury, fire or crime occur on campus, persons should call 911 from campus phones. For nonemergency situations on campus, CMU police can be reached by dialing 3081 from campus phones or 989-774-3081 from a cell phone. Staff in several campus offices are responsible for notifying CMU police when criminal acts come to their attention. Locations include the offices of Student Life and Residence Life.

Most crimes committed by CMU students on the university campus also are violations of the university’s Code of Student Rights, Responsibilities and Disciplinary Procedures. Victims are encouraged to report incidents to the Office of Student Life.

Residence halls. University residence hall staff members instruct the residents at floor and hall meetings to contact the appropriate authorities if they are victims of a crime or have any questions regarding crime or safety.

Off campus. Incidents and emergencies that occur near campus but not on university property should be reported to Isabella County Central Dispatch by calling 911 from off-campus phones. Nonemergency situations occurring at off-campus locations should be reported by calling 989-773-1000.

Help for crime victims

CMU police will assist victims by arranging transportation for medical attention, taking reports, and helping victims work with the county prosecutor and the Isabella County Trial Court. Police will forward reports on behalf of the victims to the appropriate officials. CMU offers free counseling on a 24-hour on-call basis to students who are victims of violent crimes. CMU police also have received training for assisting sexual assault victims.

Sexual assaults

An area of increasing concern for colleges and universities throughout the country is the threat of sexual assaults. CMU attempts to prevent these assaults from occurring and has policies to assist victims and to punish offenders of such assaults.

Education programs. Students receive information about sexual assaults through various programs. At academic orientation, students receive information about preventing sexual assaults. Student mentors discuss many issues concerning campus life, including general campus safety and the specific issue of sexual assault. Programs for all members of the CMU community are presented throughout the year in university residence halls. Numerous bulletin boards in the residence halls present information on these issues. Sexual Aggression Services in the Dean of Students Office also has extensive information on the issue of sexual aggression.

If a sexual offense occurs

Reporting the offense. If a sexual offense occurs on campus, persons are encouraged to contact CMU Police by calling 911 from a campus telephone. If it occurs off campus, persons are encouraged to contact Isabella County Central Dispatch by calling 911 from an off-campus telephone. Students also may contact their residence hall director, the CMU Counseling Center, CMU Health Services, the coordinator of Sexual Aggression Services or the Office of Student Life. If the incident is not reported directly to the CMU Police Department or a local law enforcement agency, the university will assist the victim in reporting the incident if he or she wishes.

Victims should avoid showering or bathing after an assault to preserve physical evidence should they pursue criminal prosecution. Clothing should be placed in a paper bag (not a plastic bag) and saved as possible evidence. The victim is encouraged to have a physical exam at a hospital. If the victim is a student, and the assault occurred more than 72 hours ago, that person is encouraged to go to the University Health Center.

Aid to victims. Victims of sexual assault may receive assistance and counseling by contacting CMU Sexual Aggression Peer Advocates at 774-2255, Mount Pleasant Women’s Aid at 772-9168 or Listening Ear at 772-2918. Students also may contact the CMU Counseling Center at 774-3381. Other options can be discussed by contacting the Sexual Aggression Services coordinator at 774-3346. Student-victims who wish to change their academic or on-campus living arrangements after an incident may contact the Sexual Aggression Services coordinator.

On-campus disciplinary procedures for sexual offenses. In addition to legal remedies sought through the court system, the victim may request that on-campus disciplinary action be brought against a student accused of the sexual offense for violating the CMU Code of Student Rights, Responsibilities and Disciplinary Procedures. Students may contact the conduct proceedings officer in the Office of Student Life for further information. Both the complainant and the student charged with the violation are entitled to have another person of their choice accompany them during the disciplinary process. Both students will be notified of the outcome of the disciplinary process.

A student who meets with the conduct proceedings officer will be provided information regarding the student’s option to notify proper law enforcement authorities. Sanctions for violating the university’s Code of Student Rights, Responsibilities and Disciplinary Procedures range from a written reprimand to dismissal from the university. Student suspension is the minimum mandatory punishment if the student is found guilty of sexual assault with penetration.

Crime prevention

CMU police officers patrol campus buildings and grounds to help ensure a safe environment for students, faculty, staff and visitors. Additional crime prevention measures are:

Safe Rides. Students, faculty and staff who would like to use Safe Rides – the on-campus ride service from 8 p.m. to 1 a.m. – should call HELP (4357) from campus phones or 989-774-4357 from a cell phone.

Blue-light phones. For campus safety, CMU has installed emergency phones across campus. These phones, each marked with a blue light, allow for reporting an emergency or a crime in progress.

Crime prevention programs. CMU police present crime prevention and law enforcement programs to students and staff upon request. Those interested should call 774-3081 to make requests. These programs may focus on general crime prevention or special topics such as money handling, theft protection, sexual misconduct prevention, and alcohol or drug abuse. Speakers also are available to talk about other topics such as pending legislation, current policies or proposed policy changes.

Residence hall programs. In addition to the programs offered by the CMU Police Department, residence hall staff members present programs to inform students about ways to avoid crime and report incidents. These programs address rape/sexual aggression, telephone harassment, self-defense, substance abuse, a door-locking campaign and other topics.

Community policing. To further develop a partnership with the campus community to prevent crime and provide a safer campus, the CMU Police Department has established a Community Policing Office in Carey Hall 111 and in Saxe Hall 155B. Each community policing office is staffed by a full-time police officer, and office hours are flexible to meet student needs. The telephone number for the Community Policing Office in Carey Hall is 774-2276 and in Saxe Hall is 774-2718.

Bicycle registration. To deter bicycle theft and recover stolen bicycles, the CMU Police Department registers bicycles for free at the CMU Police Department.

Programs for students. Crime prevention and safety pamphlets are provided in academic orientation packets. The CMU police also provide crime prevention programs upon request.

Crime information. A summary of daily criminal incidents that occur on the main campus is available at the CMU police office in the Combined Services Building and is posted online at **www.police.cmich.edu**. The university also brings serious incidents to the attention of the CMU community with timely emergency alerts.

A safe and secure campus

The university attempts to maintain the campus in a manner that reduces the likelihood of crime.

Central Alert. The Central Alert system is activated by the CMU Police Department and helps keep students, faculty and staff notified in the event of a campus delay, closing or emergency. Students, faculty and staff can register for Central Alert at **http://myaccount.cmich.edu**.

Annual Fire Safety Report. This report is available online at **www.police.cmich.edu**.

Missing student report. The Central Michigan University compliance statement for missing students who reside in on-campus housing is: If a member of the university community has reason to believe that a student who resides in on-campus housing is missing, he or she should immediately notify Central Michigan University Police at 989-774-3081. CMU police will generate a missing person report and initiate an investigation.

After investigating the missing person report, should CMU police determine that the student is missing and has been missing for more than 24 hours, CMU will notify other appropriate law enforcement agencies and the student’s emergency contact no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. If the missing student is under the age of 18 and is not an emancipated individual, CMU will notify the student’s parents or legal guardian immediately after CMU police has determined that the student has been missing for more than 24 hours.

In addition to registering an emergency contact, students residing in on-campus housing have the option to identify confidentially an individual to be contacted by CMU in the event the student is determined to be missing for more than 24 hours. If a student has identified such an individual, CMU will notify that individual no later than 24 hours after the student is determined to be missing. Students who wish to identify a confidential contact can do so by notifying Residence Life.

Emergency Preparedness. Emergency procedures are available at **www.cmich.edu/emergencyprep**.

Maintenance. Reported maintenance problems that pose a threat to safety and security such as broken locks or windows on the ground level of academic buildings and residence halls are given urgent priority.

Lighting. The campus has approximately 1,000 outside lights. To report out-of-service lights, call Facilities Management at 774-6547 and give either the general location or the number on the pole. All outside light repairs are given high priority.

Locking buildings. Administrative and academic buildings and offices are locked and unlocked by the custodial staff. The time for locking and unlocking is established by the building coordinator or the schedules and space coordinator. Access to locked buildings and offices is allowed via key or approval of the building coordinator or department head.

Keys are issued to faculty and staff through their department chairs, supervisors or building coordinators. The plant engineering and planning office issues contractors the keys to construction areas. Individuals are not permitted to duplicate keys to university facilities.

Locking residence halls. CMU residence halls typically are locked from midnight to 7 a.m. every day. Outside doors to these buildings are locked at other hours, and access is available only through admittance by residence hall staff. Individual residence hall councils may modify these hours with approval of the Residence Life Office. Every hall or set of residence halls has “student rovers” who patrol the hall during late night and early morning hours from Thursday evening through Sunday morning.

Off-campus sites. The university does not undertake any responsibility for crime prevention or for establishing or monitoring security policies and practices at off-campus sites controlled by registered student organizations.

Illegal use of alcohol and other drugs

CMU is committed to providing a campus environment free of the illegal use and abuse of alcohol and other drugs. This includes preventing illegal sale, possession and use of alcoholic beverages and enforcing state underage drinking laws. In addition, CMU is committed to enforcing federal and state laws regarding the sale, possession and use of illegal drugs. Through the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act Amendments of 1989, the university is required to adopt and implement a program aimed at preventing the illicit use of drugs and the abuse of alcohol by students and employees. Detailed information is presented in the fall and spring semester course offering guides and in the Standard Practice Guide, available in the Human Resources and Faculty Personnel offices.
