



President

Dr. Charles L. Anspach has been president of Central Michigan College since 1939.

During that span, CMC has doubled its enrollment and physical plant as it expanded into one of the major learning institutions in the nation.

President Anspach has achieved high eminence among college presidents of this generation.


His friendliness and companionship with CMC's student body has become a campus tradition. He seldom misses a campus function.

He is recognized both locally and nationally for outstanding humanitarian contributions to religious, philanthropic and civic affairs.

Dr. Anspach graduated from Ashland College of Ohio in 1919, received masters degrees there in 1920 and at the University of Michigan in 1923 and was awarded a doctorate by the U of M in 1930. President Anspach was also bestowed an honorary LLD from Ashland.

He was named registrar of Ashland in 1923, was promoted to dean in 1926 and then went to Michigan State Normal (now Eastern Michigan) in 1930 to head that college's Department of Education.

He returned to Ashland in 1935 as president before coming to CMC in 1939.



Both are former coaches with long tenures as heads of CMC teams. Finch, a CMC graduate, was head football coach from 1937 until 1947 and during that 10-year span left an impressive record of 52 wins and only 18 losses.

Rose, a former All-American basketball player at the University of Michigan, became athletic director in 1942 and coached basketball at CMC for 14 fruitful seasons, winning an amazing 75 per cent of his games. He also coached baseball.

THIS IS CMC

Central Michigan College is one of the fastest growing colleges in the State. Already, it is expanding to all corners of its vast campus with an estimated 10,000 students expected by 1970.

Originally named Central Michigan Normal School and Business Institute, the College started on September 13, 1892. From its original enrollment of 31 students-29 girls and two boys-the College continued to grow until it now has some 4.100 students on campus plus additional enrollment of more than 5,000 involved in the many phases of off-campus classes under CMC's Field Services Department.

The new Library, Physical Educaton Building and Fieldhouse together with several new residence halls and married student apartments, give the college a plant with a valuation of more than \$25,500,000 covering 200 acres.

Currently under construction is a million dollar education building near US-27 in back of Alumni Field and a men's quadrangle which is half completed with the construction of Robinson and Larzelere Halls.

CMC is particularly proud of its Health and Physical Education Department which is regarded as one of the best in the Midwest for prospective coaches.

Kenneth "Bill" Kelly, **Head Football Coach**

Since he took over as head man of the Chippewas' feotball fortunes in 1951, Coach Kelly has compiled one of the most impressive records in collegiate

In six previous seasons, his well-coached forces have lost only four conference games as the Chips all record of 44 wins, nine losses and one tie in his first six years as head CMC grid coach.

During that span, the Chips have never experienced a losing season under Kelly and the closest they have come was a 5-3 record in 1951, first under CMC's winningest coach.

Kelly is a former CMC star and was one of the school's all-time athletic greats. He still holds the record for winning the most varsity letters - 13.

Al Thomas, Backfield Coach

Now in his ninth year on the CMC coaching staff, Thomas is the man behind the Chippewas' splendid backfields. A former University of Michigan football standout, Thomas formerly coached at Ishpeming High for one year and was backfield and track coach at William and Mary for two years prior to coming to Central in 1949. Thomas was named to the All-America track team in 1942, his senior year at Michigan. Holder of a doctoral degree from Indiana, Thomas is also assistant track coach. He's a former All-State back from Detroit Cooley. Married and has two daughters.

Leo Wisneski, Line Coach

Another former CMC sports great, Wisneski earned Little All-America honors for Chips as a halfback in 1939. Coached at Pinconning, Mt. Pleasant and Bay City Central before joining CMC staff in 1948. Received masters from Columbia. Before he graduated from Central in 1941, he earned 10 varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball. In high school, he was a standout at Grand Rapids Catholic Central.





Meet Hillsdale's Coach

Now in his fourth year as head football coach of the amazing Dales, Frank 'Muddy' Waters has had phenomenal success at Hillsdale.

Although the Dales have but 439 men on campus, Waters-coached Hillsdale teams have won the MIAA grid championship for three straight years.

And what's more remarkable, during Waters' tenure as head coach, his teams have lost but once while winning 25 and tying once.

An outstanding collegiate player himself, Waters played fullback at Michigan State in the late 40's. Unbeaten teams became a habit for the youthful coaching wonder boy when he led Walled Lake High to an undefeated season only two years after being graduated from MSU.

After a successful stint at Albion High, he was named Athletic Director and Backfield coach at Hillsdale in 1953 and took over a year later as head grid coach.



FRANK 'MUDDY' WATERS Winning's A Habit

Dales' 26-Game Win Streak Is Chips' Target For Today

Central Michigan College's football team, stunned by two straight losses, today finds itself in the unfamiliar role of a long-shot underdog.

Its opponent, Hillsdale, comes into Alumni Field with one of the longest win streaks in the nation-26 straight-plus a convincing 42-7 thrashing over Lakeland, Wis. in an opening game.


Coach Bill Kelly's Chips, which saw two of the school's biggest win streaks snapped in the first two games, haven't lost three games in a row since the 1950 season.

Central, however, is pointing for an unprecedented sixth straight Interstate Conference grid crown and doesn't open league play until

The Chips have lost to Bradley, 14-7 and Western Michigan, 33-0 and today face what many consider one of the nation's outstanding small college elevens.

Once again, the strong point of the Dales is the line, led by cocaptains Dave Driscoll at Center and all-MIAA Tackle Ed St. Clair. Dave Trippett, a giant 6-2 220-pound guard, has the distinction of being drafted by the Los Angeles Rams already and is being boomed for All-America honors.

In the backfield, a fast-striking quartet of Quarterback Doug Maison, Halfbacks Don Eugenio and Walt Poe and Fullback Wayne O'Shaughnessy paced the Dales' power-packed single wing offense to an amazing 266 yards on the ground and another 58 by air against Lakeland, Wis. last weekend.
