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
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Welcome To Homecoming

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
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40th Homecoming Set

Departments, clubs, and organizations will host alumni at coffee hours and informal gatherings nearly all day Saturday.



General Chairman for Homecoming is Dr. Gilbert O. Maienknecht. Student co-chairman are Marcia Jaquith and Jim Hasselback.



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




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Queen Has Busy Schedule

Beverly Lisiecki Central's 18th Homecoming Queen, doesn't have much extra time away from her classroom and work routine.

But the 21-year-old strawberry blond is gladly setting aside this weekend for extra-curricular activity.

Saturday afternoon she will officially become Queen of Central Michigan University's 40th Homecoming celebration. CMU President Judson W. Foust will place the crown on her head at halftime of the football game.

The crowning will highlight a hectic three weeks of election campaigns, personal appearances and pre-Homecoming preparations for a girl with little time for such things.

Beverly a poised beauty with a pleasant smile and quiet, winning manner, maintains a rigorous pace in order to put herself through college and still stay active in campus activities

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
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Band Features Cole Porter

Today's halftime show will feature Central's Chippewa Marching Band in its famed Cole Porter Tribute show.

The Chippewa Marching Band first presented the Porter program two weeks ago in its halftime performance at the Chicago Bears — Philadelphia Eagles professional football game at Chicago's Wrigley Field. The show was carried over a regional CBS television and radio network.

Featured in the halftime show will be such Cole Porter favorites as "Blow, Gabriel, Blow," "I Love Paris," "Begin the Beguine," "Night and Day," and "From This Moment on."

Directed by Norman Dietz the 100-man Marching Chips will make their final appearance of the season next Saturday at the Central-Hillsdale football game at home. The final show will feature the compositions of George Gershwin.

IT TAKES CONDITIONING

Playing in a college marching band takes more than musical ability, according to Chippewa Marching Band Director Norman Dietz. It also requires no little measure of stamina.

Dietz, director of bands at Central Michigan University since 1947, claims his band members expend almost as much energy in putting on a halftime show as the players do during a game.

"Our band members move and move fast for a solid 11 or 12 minutes during a halftime show," Dietz points out. "The actual action in a football game — disregarding the time spent in huddles and between plays — doesn't amount to much more than that," he says, and then adds, "but of course we don't have that body contact."

Dietz requires his band members to get into marching shape each year. At their pre-chool training camp the members practice playing, marching and do daily calisthenics.

Northern's Rated Number 1

Today's game isn't the same one that Central anticipated playing two months ago. At that time, the Chips expected to have Dick Moffit for the full season and this game was to be the showdown battle for the Interstate Conference title just as it was a year ago.

Northern comes into the game on schedule. They have won eight straight games, averaging 36 points per game while allowing opponents less than eight points per contest. They are rated first in the country among small colleges, lead the nation in passing offense, rank second in total offense and among the top five in scoring.

That's the spot they occupied a year ago with a 6-0 record to Central's 3-4, but the Chips came from a 14-0 deficit to win, 35-27, despite a conference record passing show by George Bork who hit on 32 of 50 passes for 317 yards and two scores.

Central's Moffit outdid the passing whiz though, because he also passed for two scores and ran for three himself to Bork's two.

Moffit has been absent from the Chip scene since the second quarter of the season opener and was operated on three weeks ago for removal of cartilage from his knee.

Bork returns and is going at a pace even greater than a year ago. So far this fall, Bork has completed 201 of 306 passing attempts for 2,631 yards and 30 touchdowns with just 11 interceptions, about one per 28 attempts.

In his last IIAC game, Bork tries to add to the career conference marks he already owns. He has


thrown 422 passes, completed 260 for 3,031 yards and 26 touchdowns and set single game marks this year by completing 38 of 53 passes for 445 yards in a game in which his understudy, Ron Christian, added 5 for 12 for 47 yards. Bork is co-holder of the single-game record of six scoring passes and holds all the game and career total offense records for his school and the IIAC and most national marks also. He has thrown as many as seven TD passes in one game.

Teaming up with Bork over the last two years for most of the assault at the record books have been 6-6 end Hugh Rohrschneider and 6-0 halfback-turned-end Gary Stearns. They rank among the best in the nation at catching passes — Rohrschneider set a national record last year with 76 receptions and has caught 65 for 931 yards this year to rank him first in catches and yardage.


They aren't his only targets, however. Halfbacks Jack Dean and Ed Janoski and fullback Dave Broderick have all caught at least 20 passes.

Central will counter this aerial display with its at-times crunching ground attack led by Bill Shuple (575 yards in 122 carries), Chuck Koons (333 yards in 49 tries) and new-found running threat Bruce Wyman who had 67 yards in 13 tries last week.


Freshman Tom Annis and sophomore Pat Boyd will handle the quarter-backing while Larry Moore does a little of everything. He leads the team in scoring (52 points), receiving (14 catches for 365 yards), punting (41 kicks for a 40.9 average) and ranks in passing, rushing, total offense, tackles, interceptions, fumble recoveries, punt returns and kickoff returns — the remaining statistical categories kept.

During home-coming most of us are in a holiday mood. After the last class, the last chore of the week, we relax, get ready to meet old friends, welcome alumni, prepare for guests. Academic endeavors take, for the time being, second place, as they should.

Nevertheless, there is certain information about the academic life of Central Michigan University that a home-coming program can convey to students, alumni, and friends. The past and present can indicate the future of the University.

ACCREDITATION AND FACULTY

Last year, Central received full accreditation by the North Central Association and the National Commission on Accreditation for Teacher Education for all programs leading to bachelor's or master's degrees, and provisional accreditation of the Specialist in Education degree.

The report of the North Central Association stated explicitly that the faculty was generally strong and concerned with good teaching and that the administrative staff was well-trained and worked harmoniously with one another.

This fall 52 per cent of our faculty have the doctorate. The national average for state universities has fallen below the 40 per cent reached a few years ago.

The financial support of faculty research, although small aside from a few substantial grants, has encouraged and aided faculty publications. The alumni, through the CMU Development Fund, have contributed substantially to research and publications.

STUDENTS

In the Fall of 1963, 92 per cent of the freshmen came from the top half of their graduating class and 68 per cent came from the top third of their graduating class.

Two years ago, through the work of Dean Louise Sharp and other faculty and students, Alpha Lambda Delta, Academic Honorary for Freshmen Women, established a chapter on this campus.

Recently, Central received the approval of an official for a strong national academic honor society to initiate a petition for a chapter. Material is now being prepared for the petition.

Each year honors for high achievement have come to various student groups. In the last year, really distinctive honors have come to Central Michigan Life, the school paper. Honors earned by student groups include:

- (1) First award among Michigan Collegiate Weeklies, — CMU Life
- (2) ROTC (Two firsts and a second out of three awards at Fort Riley Advanced ROTC summer camp)
- (3) (General Sweepstakes Award of Excellence) Pi Kappa Delta National Speech contests
- (4) Tie for All Sports Trophy II AC

- (5) Recognition of music groups included invitations to several groups to appear before professional associations and repeated invitations to the band to play at half-time at one of the Chicago Bear's football games.

ALUMNI

The mark of any university is the work of their graduates. In the last year, the many facts have been learned about our graduates.

Since 1920, 112 have received doctor's degrees. In the decade, 1950-1959, 65 of Central's graduates received the doctorate. In 1961 alone, however, 22 received the doctorate. The increased enrollments and the increasing emphasis upon advanced training accounts for the increasing number. Nevertheless, it indicates that Central is increasing its preparation of students for graduate school.

Approximately 15 per cent of the public school superintendents in Michigan received their bachelor's degrees at Central. Of nineteen premedical students who went to the University of Michigan Medical School over a five-year period; seven were in the top third, eight were in the middle third, and only four were in the bottom third.

Undoubtedly, there are other statistical data that the University should have about its alumni. Reports of individual achievement that cannot be classified for statistical treatment are no less important, but space and propriety prohibit their presentation here. In a word, however, the achievement of Central alumni in many professions and in many businesses has helped to create a firm foundation upon which professional accreditation and further academic recognition of the University will be built.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Dr. Wilbur E. Moore became Central's Vice-President for Academic Affairs in 1959, part of Central's academic growth which he summarizes in terms of accomplishments in this article about his area of concern within the University.

Remember When

Central Honors Class of '38

Each year during its Annual Homecoming, Central Michigan University takes time to welcome and honor its graduates. The special honor conferred each year is induction into the Silver C Club.

The Silver C Club honors graduates who received their degrees from Central 25 years ago with a prized certificate and a dinner.

This year's honored group at the Silver C dinner Saturday is the Class of 1938 whose president was Richard Wysong, now head of the history and political science department at Central.

Wysong won the office by a single vote over Victor Croftchik, now head of the art department. All the elections for the officers of the class of '38 were quite close. Only class vice-president Rodney Rodgers and student body representative Ralph Myers seemed to have great pluralities. Esther Hawley and Doris Sheldon won their respective secretary and treasurer posts over Virgilene Dahlgren and Patrick Ennis by just three votes each.

Wysong was the class salutatorian with a 2.67 average (3.0 was straight A) and won the University of Michigan scholarship for a year of graduate study in Ann Arbor.

His older brother Willis was the valedictorian with a 2.75 average. Willis was cast as Ki-Ram in the satiric opera, "The Sultan of Sulu" with Richard as Col. Jefferson Budd to head a cast of 65 persons.

The school's enrollment as classes resumed for the fall quarter in September of 1937 stood at 970, the highest since the record 1,104 in 1930. There were some 400 freshmen included in the total.

Dr. David M. Trout was the new head of the psychology and education department, replacing Dr. E. C. Rowe. Dr. Louis Hutto replaced Dr. C. F. Tumbling as the physical education department head.

Maxine Addy was the editor-in-chief of LIFE, the campus paper, with Jerry Rideout serving the first of two years as editor of CHIPPEWA. The year book was dedicated Pres. E. C. Warriner. Bob Slingerland was the editor of CENTRALIGHT, a quarterly educational publication.

Joe Carey of the geography department was the head of the faculty athletic committee. A new football and basketball coach debuted in the 1937-38 academic year with Ron Finch running the football show and Danny Rose the basketball team. Rose coached the freshman gridgers and Finch the frosh cagers. Rose also handled baseball with Frank Kersjes the football line coach. Al Fortino captained the football team.

All of the varsity teams had winning records with coach Charles V. Park's tennis squad posting its third straight unbeaten season. Underclassman Jack Benford highlighted the track season by breaking George Lauer's 12-year old low hurdles record of 26.7 with a time of 25.4. Lauer is now Central's registrar.

Darrell Burras was the varsity club president with Jerry Udell as vice-president and Victor Croftchik as secretary-treasurer.

Band director Preston Mayhew had a 45-piece Central marching band, new uniforms and the best balance in terms of instruments in the history of the band. Burton Swope was the drum major and Marion Town the baton twirler.

Clair White served as student council president.

Central trounced Northern State Teachers College (now Northern Michigan), 32-0, in the 14th annual Homecoming. The freshman supplied the bonfire for the big pep rally and a dance was held Friday night to kick off the Homecoming week-end. The girls' literary societies (there were no sororities as the University has them today) feted their alumnae at a breakfast at the Mt. Pleasant country club while the men entertained their guests at the Park Hotel and the Blackstone.

Pres. Warriner was given an honorary doctorate degree at Alma that year and Lynn Waldorf, coach at Northwestern and later at California, was the speaker at the football bust honoring the team that posted a six-won, two-lost record. Dr. James Naismith, the inventor of basketball, spoke at the "Army Supper" sponsored by the Men's Union during the winter term. The Men's Union president was John McConnell with Ralph Myers as secretary-treasurer.

Carl Obrecht, Homer Robinson and Henry Buell formed a local chapter of the House of David, the only requirement being that a person had to be able to grow a beard to join.

In the spring of 1938, Ron Finch ran the first of his now-legend Central Relays with 56 schools sending 1,080 high school boys to take part. Those totals today reach 200 high schools and over 3,000 athletes.

DeForest Poole and his Grand Rapids orchestra played for the J-Hop which was a sell-out. Frank Bullard and Arthur Seltzer debated on Michigan State's WKAR-FM station and acquitted themselves nobly.

The Appleblossom English Folk Dancers, directed by Betty Tone, won first place in the Campus Capers, the school's variety show.

The Senior Dance was held at the Midland Country Club to the music of Frank Sage and his 10-piece orchestra. Alumni Association President Mrs. G. E. Lamb of Farwell was one of the speakers at the Senior Dinner. The Commencement Play was "The Night of January 16" and was well received.

Commencement speaker at graduation exercises for the Class of '38 was Francis L. Bailey, Commissioner of Education in Vermont.

Other members of that class now on the CMU staff and faculty included Don Carr, Alumni director, Karl Howe, commerce, and James Hodgins, English.

Many of the faculty members still remain at Central, although some have been promoted as the faculty has grown. Those still here who were on the faculty then include George DePuy, Judson W. Foust, Faith Johnston, Cleon Richmeyer, Charles V. Park, Dan Rose, Fred Bush, Malcolm Filson, Rachel Loughridge, Rolland Maybee and George Nelson.



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

won or shared six titles, going undefeated in 1952, 1956 and 1962

An outspoken, colorful grid-master, Kelly was named Michigan "Coach of the Year" following the 1959 season. He is credited with playing an important role in building Central into a recognized small-college football power.

Kelly is married and the father of two daughters, both married.

AL THOMAS — BACKFIELD COACH

Al Thomas, a former University of Michigan football and track star, has been grooming Central's football backs and track men since he joined the CMU staff in 1949.

Thomas graduated from Michigan in 1942 after winning All-American track honors and serving as captain of the Wolverine track squad his senior year. He received his doctor's degree from the University of Indiana in 1955.

Thomas came to Central after coaching at Ishpeming High School for a year and at William and Mary College for two years. He gave up his assistant track coaching duties in August, 1952, when he was named Chairman of the Physical Education Area of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. He retained his duties as assistant football coach and director of the nation's largest high school track meet, the Central Michigan University Relays.

He is married and the father of two daughters.

JERRY SIERACKI — LINE COACH

A former Chippewa lineman himself, Jerry Sieracki is beginning his third year as varsity line coach under his own former football tutor, Bill Kelly.

Just 24, Sieracki graduated from Central in 1960 after winning four letters. He served as a graduate assistant and line coach of the freshman team in 1960 before moving into his present job.

A native of Grand Rapids, Sieracki graduated from Catholic Central High School in 1956 after being named to a first team All-City berth and third team All-State tackle slot. At Central he was an All-IIAC choice at guard his senior year.

Sieracki is also advisor of the lettermen's club at CMU and has been instrumental in promoting the annual Old-Timer's Game in the spring in which he has appeared as a player and coach. He is married to the former Virginia Weller.


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Daniel Rose

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR DANIEL P. ROSE

Dan Rose, Central's bustling Athletic Director, has been a hallmark in the CMU athletic department since 1937 when he (along with the late Ron Finch) joined the sports staff here.

Rose joined the Central staff after coaching basketball for eight years at Grand Rapids South High School. At CMU, he took over as head basketball and baseball coach and as freshmen football mentor in addition to his teaching duties.

He became Athletic Director in 1942 and the growing duties of that position forced him to give up baseball in 1952 and basketball in 1954. During his 14 years as basketball coach, his Chippewa teams won 174, lost 84 and only twice failed to win at least half of its games.

During his own college days at the University of Michigan, Rose lettered in football and basketball, was an honor student and served as president of his senior class. At 5-feet-6, he was one of the shortest men to ever play basketball there — where he won All-American recognition.

DEAN WILLIAM V. THEUNISSEN

Dr. William Theunissen assumed the duties of Dean of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation last June, succeeding the late Ron Finch who died in April after serving on the Central staff since 1937.

Theunissen, a 1947 graduate of Central, grew up in Mt. Pleasant and graduated in 1943 as class valedictorian from Mt. Pleasant High School. He received his M. A. from Michigan in 1948 and his doctorate from Indiana in 1955.

A member of the Central faculty since 1948, he had served the previous eight years as administrative assistant to Finch.

Theunissen served as head baseball coach for ten years, during which time his teams compiled a 151-114-1 record. His other coaching experience at Central included various duties in baseball, football and basketball.

An avid golfer, he has won the local country club championship eight times. He is married to the former Dorothy Eddy; they have four children.

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
