

Chippewas Face IIAC Power

In early-season and pre-season estimates, Coach Art Dufelmeier's Western Illinois Leathernecks were ranked as one of the three teams to beat and WIU's impressive pre-league showings in springing some surprises against rugged non-loop foes have kept the Leathernecks right on schedule. Central and Northern Illinois shared the tri-

favorite ranking with Western, but Central's role has been reduced substantially after the loss to Eastern Illinois two weeks ago.

Still, Coach Bill Kelly's crew could throw the race into a dither with a couple of well-played games on the right Saturdays and today's game is one of those must games.

WIU HOLDS SERIES EDGE


Western holds an 8-6 edge in the 14 game series and won last year's encounter, 28-7, at Macomb. Two years ago at WIU, Central won 17-0 and started its run at the IIAC championship. Even though the teams have enjoyed some high-scoring shows in the past, the most recent games have featured sturdy defensive play. In the all-time scoring in the series, Western holds a two-point edge, proof of the close rivalry of the teams.

WYMAN HAVING GOOD YEAR

It is doubtful if any back in the state has gained more yards by using his legs than Bruce Wyman. Little-used in his first year at Central as a junior in 1963, the hard-run-ning 200-pounder has come on in great fashion this year. Running in wind-mill

fashion with the power of a runaway tank, Wyman



has churned for 477 yards by rushing alone, added 137 on kickoff returns, 94 on punt returns and 2 more on pass receptions. This all adds up to 710 yards in the 84 times he has touched the ball.

An aggressive defensive player at linebacker or halfback, Wyman averaged about 55 minutes per game for the first two contests before being limited in his play just to offensive action to keep him fresh for ball-toting duties.

The fastest back on the team, the sturdy 5-foot-10 Constantine native has been Central's moving force in a respectable ground attack.

CAGERS START DRILLS

Coach Ted Kjolhede's CMU cagers opened drills Thursday for the 1964-65 season which sees the team facing a 24-game card plus the Alumni game. Central will be defending its hard-won Interstate Conference crown, the first cage title in CMU's years in the league.

Starters San Breidinger, Bob Bruder, Don Edwards and Tom Pelkey return with last year's sixth man, Bill Peters, first in line for graduated Dave Nelson's spot.


AT HALFTIME TODAY



KENNETH "BILL" KELLY - HEAD COACH

The 1964 season marks Bill Kelly's 35th year in the coaching profession and his 14th season as head coach at Central Michigan, tops in grid coaching seniority.

Kelly attended Central from 1926 to 1930. After his graduation he coached at Cass City, Mt. Pleasant and Saginaw Arthur Hill before returning to CMU in 1951 as football and tennis coach. He coached CMU varsity basketball from 1954-56.

During his 13 years at the helm at Central, Kelly's teams have won 77, lost 43 and tied one to establish him as the most winning coach in school history. In the Interstate Conference his teams have won or shared six titles, going undefeated in 1952, 1956 and 1962.

An outspoken, colorful grid-master, Kelly was named Michigan "Coach of the Year" following the 1959 season. He is credited with playing an important role in building Central into a recognized smallcollege football power.

Kelly is married and the father of two daughters, both married.

AL THOMAS - BACKFIELD COACH

Al Thomas, a former University of Michigan football and track star, has been grooming Central's football backs for 15 years since he joined the CMU staff in 1949.

Thomas graduated from Michigan in 1942 after winning All-American track honors and serving as captain of the Wolverine track squad his senior year. He received his doctor's degree from the University of Indiana in 1955.

Thomas came to Central after coaching at Ish-peming High School for a year and at William and Mary College for two years. He gave up his assistant track coaching duties in August, 1962, when he was named Chairman of the Physical Education Area of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. He has retained his duties as assistant football coach and director of the nation's largest high school track meet, the Central Michigan University Relays.

He is married and the father of two daughters.

JERRY SIERACKI - LINE COACH

A former Chippewa lineman himself, Jerry Sieracki is in his fourth year as varsity line coach under his own former football tutor, Bill Kelly.

Sieracki graduated from Central in 1960 after winning four letters. He served as a graduate assist-ant and line coach of the freshman team in 1960 before moving into his present job.


A native of Grand Rapids, Sieracki graduated from Catholic Central High School in 1956 after be-ing named to a first team All-City berth and third team All-State tackle slot. At Central he was an All-IIAC choice at guard his senior year.

Sieracki is also advisor of the lettermen's club at CMU and has been instrumental in promoting the annual Old-Timer's Game in the spring in which he has appeared as a player and coach with the alumni. He is married to the former Virginia Weller.

Guiding CMU's Athletics

DEAN WILLIAM V. THEUNISSEN

Dr. William Theunissen assumed the duties of Dean of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation in 1962, after 14 years on the Central staff as coach, teacher and administrative assistant.

Theunissen, a 1947 graduate of Central, grew up in Mt. Pleasant and graduated in 1943 as class valedictorian from Mt. Pleasant High School. He received his M.A. from Michigan in 1948 and his doctorate from Indiana in 1955.

A member of the Central faculty since 1948, he had served the previous eight years as administrative assistant to Finch.

Theunissen served as head baseball coach for ten years, during which time his teams compiled a 151-114-1 record. His other coaching experience at Central included various duties in baseball, football and basketball.

An avid golfer, he has won the local country club championship nine times, five times in succession. He is married to the former Dorothy Eddy; they have four children.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR DANIEL P. ROSE

Dan Rose, Central's bustling Athletic Director, has been a hallmark in the CMU athletic department since 1937 when he (along with the late Ron Finch) joined the sports staff here.

Rose joined the Central staff after coaching basketball for eight years at Grand Rapids South High School. At CMU, he took over as head basketball and baseball coach and as freshman football mentor in addition to his coaching du-

ties.

He became Athletic Director in 1942 and the growing duties of that position forced him to give up baseball in 1952 and basketball in 1954. During his 14 years as basketball coach, his Chippewa teams won 174, lost 84 and only twice failed to win at least half of its games.

During his own college days at the University of Michigan, Rose lettered in football and basketball, was an honor student and served as president of his senior class. At 5-feet-6, he was one of the shortest men to ever play basketball there — where he won All-American recognition.

The EIU Panthers share the lead with Northern Illinois which had to put on a 20-point splurge in the fourth quarter to overcome a 14-point Illinois State lead after three periods of play.

NIU's Jack Dean, a speedy halfback, shifted into the trigger spot on the shotgun offense and scored all 20 points, the last eight on called pass plays. Dean's receivers were covered and he was forced to run and did.

The 166-pound speedster was named the IIAC's Back of the Week as he gained 53 yards rushing and 98 passing, virtually all of them in the final quarter.

His teammates, corner linebacker John Haar, broke up three key passes, intercepted a pass to set up the second NIU score and recovered a fumble to

Quarterback Roger Haberer had a 22-39 passing day for over 220 yards and passed for the EIU TD.

In last week's game here, Northern Michigan held off CMU in the fourth quarter for a 12-7 win. Bruce Wyman had 127 yards rushing for CMU. Pat Boyd connected on 15 of 23 passes.

Northern Illinois rounds out the IIAC slate this week with a non-league home date against Bradley.


