

Toledo Here Next Saturday

Another of the intense rivalries that have blossomed since Central joined the Mid-American Conference will be resumed here next Saturday when the Chippewas host the University of Toledo.

The two teams dueling for the football title last fall through the final Saturday afternoon and were named the top two contenders in this year's preseason football poll. The two will collide at 1:30 p.m. in front of the annual Youth Day gathering.

"Big Run" Building Steam for Oct. 19

"The Big Run" scheduled for Sunday, October 19 is building a head of steam, according to Ted Kjolhede, CMU athletic director.

Thirty-seven organizations and/or teams representing 900 persons have signed up to participate in the gigantic jogathon, which is intended to raise funds to ease inflationary strain on the university's athletic teams and department.

"Pledges turned in so far total \$4,000, which is not substantial," states Kjolhede. "We would like to have another 30 organizations signed up and a total of \$15,000 pledged by September 29."

Beginning September 30, the athletic director's office will publish those persons or organizations or businesses that have pledged \$250 or more.

Annually, CMU enrolls approximately 16,600 students who represent all 83 Michigan counties. Undergraduate education and quality teaching are emphasized at CMU; the university offers diplomas in ten degree-granting programs.

Internationally, CMU provides a non-traditional degree-granting program through its Institute for Personal and Career Development. IPCD enrolls approximately 8,000 adults in class centers from

Camps Contribute to CMU Football Story

Another part of the total CMU football story is the annual summer football camp operated for two weeks by the football coaching staff and guest coaches.

The first week deals with youngsters in eighth through tenth grades, headed this past summer by Denny LaFleur, Central's defensive ends coach. The first week is low key, designed to teach basic football principles and conditioning. The second week, this year led by defensive line coach Jim Schulte, is designed to be more intense drilling and preparation for the high school football season.

The number of students accepted for the football camps is limited to ensure individual attention, explains Schulte. Thus, the first session this year handled approximately 100 youngsters with ten coaches. The second session saw 240 players working with 18 coaches, including eight guest high school coaches. They were: Jack Bridges of Dearborn Edsel Ford, Hilt Foster of Mt. Pleasant, Rich Jeric of Monroe, Ron Labadie of Marshall, John Loop of Bay City John Glenn, Ron Reardon of Chippewa Hills, Gary Rojas of Sterling Heights Ford and Pete Schmidt of Okemos.

The daily camp format included breakfast; a two-hour morning


session on agility and conditioning; lunch; an afternoon session of two to two-and-one-half hours on offensive and defensive techniques; a two-hour free period in which the players use the university's physical education facilities; dinner; an evening session of one-and-one-half hours on specialty techniques such as kicking, long-snapping, quarterbacking and pass receiving, followed by highlight films.

Each football camp concluded with an awards assembly during which the coaches recognized an extensive list of players for honors.

Graduate Assistants Important to CMU Football Family

Three graduate aides will assist the 1980 CMU football coaching staff. Returning for a second year in the job is 1977 Chippewa All-MAC linebacker Denny Starnes. A graduate of Waterford Kettering High School and recently an assistant coach at Mt. Pleasant High School, Starnes will help assistant coach John Townsend with the Central defensive backfield and oversee the defensive scout team in practices.

Plas Presnell, a 1973 Michigan State University graduate and former Allen Park resident who has been teaching and coaching in the Charlevoix school system, will assist Mike Poff in coaching the offensive linemen.

Women Join the Mid-American Conference

The CMU women's athletic program and those of the other Mid-American Conference schools are joining the league this fall by means of invitational tournaments for seven sports.

The tournaments are the second step in the phase-in of women's athletics into the conference. The organizational aspect began last year. Next year official league championships will begin. The following year will see championships for three additional sports.

The year's schedule of women's MAC invitacionals includes:

The winners of the invitacionals will not be named MAC champions this year, and their finishing place will not be counted toward the league's All-Sports Trophy.

The three sports to be phased in later are field hockey, basketball and softball.

Fran Koenig, CMU's associate director of athletics and director of women's athletics, perceives benefits for Central from the women's entry into the league: "There will be a conference winner and that will give the women something to look forward to. The fact the women will be going at something besides a state championship is the biggest asset of the whole idea." She noted also that the publicity for the women will improve.

Fred Jacoby, MAC commissioner, stated that moving the women into the conference will mean a better identity for them and will create a meaningful championship to culminate their

league year. He pointed out that the MAC is one of the first conferences in the country to put men's and women's programs under one structure.

Follow the Chippewas in every sport! More than 500 CMU athletes participate in 23 varsity men's and women's sports. And at Central, athletics is a winning proposition. The 1979-80 season garnered an overall combined win record of 182-128-14, including 93 wins for the men's teams and 89 wins for the women.

In addition, the men held the best records in the MAC in the major sports of football, basketball, baseball and track and field, including two outright championships in football and baseball. The women earned most-wins-ever records in basketball and softball and won the state title in volleyball for the third consecutive year. With luck and fan support, CMU athletes will produce another successful sports campaign in 1980-81.

Marching Chippewas Show Their 'Brass'



The brass section of CMU's marching band carries the major responsibility for the power of the Chippewa Sound. The trumpets provide the soprano voice and most often project the melody to the Shorts Stadium stands. Their brilliance causes the electricity to flow over the band's lower voices. The trombones cover the tenor voice along with the bass trumpets which carry the baritone line. With their large bells, the horns play an important part not only in carrying the alto voice, but by playing soaring and often intense counterlines which add to the excitement of the Chippewa Sound. The tubas, naturally, are the bass voice and are responsible for the foundation and depth of the band's musical arrangements. The balancing and coloring of these various voices produce the memorable sound of the Marching Chippewas.





Perry Shorts Stadium Particulars

Welcome to Perry Shorts Stadium. We hope you enjoy your visit and will return often to Central Michigan University. The following information is offered to assist you in utilizing the stadium's services and facilities.

SEATING

During football games all the seats on the east sideline (behind the CMU team bench) are for the use of Central's students on a first-come, first-served basis. The seating behind the south end zone is for general admission ticket holders and any overflow from the student seating section.

All reserved ticket seats, including season tickets, are in the west stands (behind visiting team's bench). The sections are identified by aisles, lettered A-H, with Aisle A at the north end. Rows are numbered 1-36, starting at field level. Seats 1-14 are to the left of the aisle, 15-28 to the right.

GOLDEN SEATS

In order to stimulate fund-raising for the \$1.5 million campaign that helped pay for the stadium, a Golden Seat section was created under the press box. Tickets in this sheltered area are lettered CC, DD, EE, FF and numbered rows 37-42. The 410 seats are sold on a season-ticket basis only and are restricted to those CMU boosters who contributed \$600 per seat during the stadium building campaign.

TICKETS

Tickets are sold Monday through Friday in the ticket offices at the Dan Rose Center, adjacent to the stadium, and at the University Center on Preston Street. On game days, the stadium ticket booths open at 10 a.m. General admission tickets are always sold on game days plus any unsold reserved seats. Tickets for future home games will be on sale at the stadium booths immediately after the home games. The top prices are \$6 for reserved and \$4 for general admission. Some road game tickets can be purchased during the week at the Rose Center ticket office. For additional ticket information, call (517) 774-3041 Monday through Friday.

EMERGENCY AID

Authorized personnel are on duty to render emergency medical treatment in the first aid room which is located behind the south concession stand under the press box. Doctors may use the telephone in the first aid room to respond to emergency calls. Central Michigan Community Hospital has an ambulance crew on standby duty at all home games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found items should be turned in or reported at the south concession stand during the game. After the game, CMU's public safety office, corner of East Campus Drive and Preston Street, will accept these items and reports. Individuals who are separated from their companions should plan on reuniting just inside the stadium's north entrances either during the halftime or immediately after the game.

EMERGENCY ANNOUNCEMENTS

Emergency public address announcements only should be brought to the south entrance of the press box.

REST ROOMS

Public rest rooms are available in the service buildings behind the stands on both sides of the field. The entrances to the rest rooms are on the sides away from the playing field.

PUBLIC TELEPHONES

Pay telephones are available behind the service buildings on each side of the field.


CONCESSION STANDS

Food, drink and souvenirs may be purchased at the concession stands at each end of the service buildings on both sides of the field. Administered by the University's Food Services, the stands are augmented by soft drink booths at the southeast and southwest corners of the stadium.

BACKGROUND

CMU's football home is named after the late R. Perry Shorts, a Central alumnus who played on the 1899 team and through his industriousness and intelligence became a banking and civic leader in Saginaw. He established scholarships at the University in his sisters' names. As the University's oldest living football letterman, he spoke briefly but enthusiastically during the stadium dedication ceremonies in November, 1972. The Chippewas defeated Illinois State, 28-21, that day.

The stadium features the first collegiate Astro Turf playing surface in the state, has more than 20,000 permanent seats, can easily accommodate an additional 5,000 temporary bleachers and has been utilized for numerous activities in addition to football practice and games.




Dr. Tom Keating, a Saginaw native who has practiced medicine in Mt. Pleasant the last five years, is facing his first year as team physician for all CMU's athletic squads. He has performed orthopedic surgery and treatment on injured Chippewa athletes in the past, but now takes on additional, overall duties as the team physician.

The student football trainers undertake extensive duties, including pre-practice and pre-game tapings, conditioning (including both weight-watching and weight-lifting), rehabilitation and post-injury care, creation of pads for protecting injuries, paperwork on injury treatment, therapy and follow-up.

During games, the trainers are responsible for "sideline care," anticipating the needs of Kopke and Keating in injury situations, checking on player injuries and providing fluids and foods which include oranges, Chip-ade and soft drinks.



Raymond Lamour Cabarris, 5-11, 185-pound defensive back, earned three letters in football and was named All-City linebacker his junior year on the 1975 league champion Detroit Southwestern team. The following season, just three days before the first scrimmage, he was diagnosed with a bone problem and therefore spent his final high school year helping to coach the defensive unit of his teammates. From his coach, Joe Hoskins, he learned the four Ds of successful football play: Desire, Dedication, Determination and Discipline. "And that's what I play by," states Cabarris.

A walk-on his freshman year at Central, Cabarris exclaims, "I'd like to play pro ball, but probably I'll have to walk on there, too!"

A history major with a physical education minor, Cabarris will be able to use his degree to teach and coach on the high school level.

Cabarris gives much of the credit for his coming to CMU to his mother who comes to every game. That motivation carries over even to practice: "I get psyched up in practice . . . I've got to use what I learn in practice . . . I enjoy practice. It's a good release from the tension of classes every day," he claims.

Cabarris assesses the Chippewa team: "Every person to the last man comes from a winning background and believes we're winners." He feels the MAC championship is not that elusive a goal: "We got as good a chance as anybody . . . But, everybody's got to do his part." His personal goal this year is "to get better every day."

One of the special factors of CMU football for Cabarris is the Shorts Stadium crowd, which he claims does help get the players fired up. Personally, it helps him because "I don't believe in letting anybody down — and besides, they all know your number!"

Coach Blackledge Brings Flashes from Kent

Named Kent State's 11th head coach in April, 1978, Ron Blackledge began this, his third year at KSU, with a career coaching record of 5-17. He joined the KSU staff in April of 1977 as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach.

Blackledge had served as assistant coach at four previous colleges: Ashland (1968-69), University of Cincinnati (1970-72), University of Kentucky (1973-75) and Princeton (1976). He had worked also on the coaching staff as a graduate assistant at Ohio University (1966-67).

Coach Blackledge began coaching at Canton South High School in 1960 as head baseball coach and assistant football coach. He also served as head coach at Canton Timken (1963-65) and as assistant coach at Canton Glenwood in 1967.

A standout athlete at Bowling Green, Blackledge earned All-Mid-American Conference honors as an end in 1959. A four-year letterman, he helped the team compile a 22-3-2 record from 1957-59. He also played third base on the BGSU baseball team for

three years. Blackledge was inducted into the Falcons' Hall of Fame in 1972.

At Canton Timken High School, Blackledge earned nine varsity letters playing three years each on the football, baseball and basketball teams. He graduated from Canton Timken in 1956.

Blackledge is a 1960 graduate of BGSU with a B.A. degree in physical education and a 1967 graduate of Ohio University with an M.A. degree in education.

TRACKING TODAY'S TEAMS

Golden Flashes Make Conference Debut Today

At first glance, today's Mid-American Conference clash between CMU's unbeaten Chippewas and winless Kent State University would appear to be a mismatch.

But, as many a veteran observer has said, looks can be deceiving. The Golden Flashes from Kent, Ohio, will come into the contest anxious to make a quick turnaround in their fortunes.

Coach Ron Blackledge's squad has lost its first two games of the season but will be making its 1980 conference debut this afternoon. A win over the defending champion Chippewas would be a big tonic for the Flashes. KSU has dropped its last eight starts, including last season.

Kent State is the only Ohio team to defeat CMU since the Chippewas began MAC play. That victory occurred right here in 1976.

Central's 3-0 start includes two conference victories and has extended its unbeaten streak to 21 games, third longest in the nation behind

Alabama and Southern California. More importantly, a win today would give CMU sole possession of first place in the MAC since unbeaten Western Michigan is playing outside the conference this afternoon.

KSU has struggled to establish its offense this fall. It has managed only one touchdown in losing at Marshall, 17-7, and Navy, 31-3. The Golden Flashes lost the ball seven times last Saturday at Navy on four interceptions, two fumbles and a blocked punt.

Central also was guilty of being its own worst enemy last week but managed to overcome the penalties and lost fumbles with the aid of some explosive specialty teams play. Placekicker Novo Bojovic (2) scored 10 points with a point-after-touchdown kick, a 27-yard field goal and a stadium-stunning 19-yard touchdown on a fake-field-goal pass.

Both teams are known for their hard-hitting defenses. The Chippewas were encouraged in last week's 16-0 shutout over Illinois State by the improved play of linebackers Bret Hyble (55), Jon Kitts (56) and Ray Bentley (57) along with the intricate defensive linemen.

KSU's Golden Flashes have experienced performers everywhere on defense except at the ends. Four starters — Jeff Sisterhen (30), Joe Gogol (12), Sam Sopp (17) and Van Jakes (22) — return in the secondary.

Quarterback Jeff Morrow (13) was injured last Saturday and is an uncertain performer today. His absence would place added pressure on halfback J. C. Stafford (24), fullbacks Jon Dwyer (25) and Mike Moeller (46) plus No. 2 quarterback Pat Gladfelder (16).

CMU lost the first four times it played Kent State, starting in 1948, but has a chance to even the series at 5-5 today.

Mike Poff Coaches Offensive Line



MIKE POFF
coaching at the college level is very impressive," states Coach Herb Deromedi.

Mike Poff, former Miami University center and varsity captain and Hastings High School assistant coach, is coaching the Chippewa offensive line for the third year.

"Mike is a tremendous technician who understands offensive line play. He proved himself as a quality player at Miami University. When he worked with us as a graduate assistant in 1973, he earned very favorable comments from the young players he instructed. Mike's enthusiasm for

"I want to be a student of the game. It's important to understand the game well . . . But, the longer I'm in football, the more I find the less I know."

Poff speaks seriously and with great concern for his unit of players. His specific responsibilities are the inside running game and the line, which he feels this year "has the ability to be a great line if the players will work up to that ability."

He states, "If we can avoid injury, we can do it (win the MAC) again . . . And we have to have luck. Nobody wins a championship without luck."

Poff feels the most difficult aspect of the game for college offensive linemen is the diversity of demands upon the use of their hands. In addition, there is the multiplicity of techniques for each position within the unit. Also, there is the constant pressure of being ready to make immediate adjustments upon seeing any one of a huge number of different defenses and defensive shifts. Poff understands this pressure personally; having been a center, he

was required to snap the ball 80 times per game with perfect timing.

In coaching his unit, Poff works extremely hard on technique "right down to toes, ankles, knees and hips." He teaches his players "to step first, then read." He breaks down each technique into individual moves. He admits that "I'm so involved with the inside game, in practice I often don't know where the ball is."

On game day, Poff sees his job as getting his players prepared mentally for their job on the field. He believes in building up their pride in their contribution to the total team effort.

That team pride is one of the reasons Poff feels Coach Deromedi is a successful coach and person. Poff explains that Deromedi treats everyone with respect, does not interfere with his coaches' work and gives his coaches the responsibility and latitude in which to make their own mistakes. Poff says, "Every year I'm with Herb, I find more and more to respect him for. It would be very hard to leave Herb."

Poff uses the computer printouts created by the team's graduate assistants to anticipate what types and numbers of defenses the opponent will use. He makes up a composite of the defense's "look," which might consist of 25 different defenses. He explains, "If we see a new or different defense against us, I should be able to analyze it in five minutes and come up with a counter action."

In recruiting for offensive linemen, Poff claims he looks for size first in athletes. "Then feet — they have to have good feet. They have to have the ability to move their feet." Next, he looks for the ability to hit. He feels that speed is not a factor in the makings of a good offensive lineman.




Grobbel has a casual, breezy manner about which he comments: "I joke around a lot . . . I have to stay loose."



Three-Man Staff Equips Football Team

Armies may run on their stomachs, but football teams run on their equipment — 15 to 20 pieces of equipment per player. When the team numbers in the range of 125 players, there are 2,500 pieces of equipment to be inventoried, laundered, repaired, stored, packed for away games and replaced on the player's shelf. The 2,500 pieces of equipment include shirts, pants, socks, shoes, supporters, helmets, knee pads, thigh pads, hip pads, shoulder pads, elbow pads, hand pads and gloves.

Louie Doughty, a member of the Central Michigan University family since 1969, is equipment manager supervising the Shorts stadium football equipment room. He is assisted by two sophomores: Dave Pawlak of Monroe and Tim Williams of Middleton.

On the days of two practices prior to the start of school and on Labor Day, the three staff members work in the equipment room from 6 to 10 a.m. and from 1 to 6:30 p.m. Once classes begin with a single practice each day, the equipment staff works from 1 to 6 p.m. On a home game day, they start at 10:30 a.m. and finish up around 4:30 p.m. In addition, Doughty travels with the team to away games to ensure the safe arrival back at Shorts stadium of the 800 pieces of equipment that went on the road.

The actual laundering of 125 uniforms and towels after every practice and game is handled in the Rose Center equipment room by other members of the university's equipment staff. Led by senior equipment manager Dan Bookey, the staff includes Roy Rudolph and Jim Powell, equipment managers, and 15-18 student aides.

Doughty has developed two techniques for speeding up work in the football equipment room. All pieces of a player's practice uniform are laundered in a single bag

which is tagged by player name and number. This idea speeds up the handling of hundreds of items and minimizes the number of lost pieces. Also, every player has in the equipment room a "game shelf" upon which is stored every piece of equipment that particular player needs for playing in a game. To pack for away games, the equipment staff merely empties each player's shelf into his respective travel bag. Even with this time- and energy-saving method, Doughty claims it takes three days to pack for game trips.

will join the Rose Bowl as the only post-season Division I games that are restricted to specific conference champions. The MAC will allow its other member-teams to play in any other sanctioned bowl games.




