

### CMU Teams See Invitational Action This Week

Central Michigan University's women's tennis and men's golf teams make one of their rare fall appearances this Sunday and Monday in invitational action.

Coach Jan Helfrich's netters will play in the Notre Dame Invitational at Notre Dame, IN., while the golfers of Coach Leo Wisneski will take part in the Moors Invitational in Kalamazoo.

The CMU soccer team, sporting a fine 7-4 record through its first 11 outings, is at Ohio State this Saturday. Coach Jim Hornak's booters are led by high-scoring junior Dave Daugherty (12 goals in the first 11 games).

Coach Don Sazima's cross country team will make its second and final home appearance of the season Saturday at 10:30 a.m. when it faces Western Michigan at Rose Center. Junior Jeff Drenth of Charlevoix and senior Bob Duerksen of Mancelona give CMU a fine one-two punch.

The women harriers take part in the Western Illinois Invitational on Saturday. CMU is coached by Vranda Barclay.

### CMU Sports Face Full Schedule

Champions in three straight tournaments entering this weekend's Michigan State Invitational, Coach Marcy Weston's outstanding volleyball team will be in action twice this week.

The Chippewas will be at Grand Valley State on Tuesday at 6:30 p.m., and then will host Ball State at 4 p.m. on Oct. 16 in Rose Center.

CMU, second in its first tournament at Cleveland State, has won invitationals at Northern Illinois, Illinois State and Western Michigan to run its record to 21-3. Last year's team won a school record 55 against 14 losses.


The only other team at home this week other than the CMU football squad which entertains Toledo next Saturday for "CMU and You Day" and "Band Day," is the women's field hockey team.

Coach Mary Bottaro's chargers meet Western Michigan University at 4 p.m. on Tuesday at the Rose Fields. The Chippewas were 5-5 through last weekend's action. Senior Cathy Gibson of Clinton led CMU in scoring with eight goals and three assists while junior Rosemary Gross of Detroit had four goals and four assists.

The field hockey team also plays at the Michigan State Invitational this coming Friday and Saturday.





## Maestros of the Marching Chippewas

The exhilarating and truly distinctive pre-game and halftime performances of CMU's Chippewa Marching Band result from the direction of two members of the Department of Music. They are John E. In his fourth year at CMU, Williamson produces the Exciting Chippewa Sound. Saunders, a 17-year faculty member, plots the intricate, precision movements of the 210-member marching band.

## The Mid-American Conference

Central Michigan University is one of ten major midwestern universities in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Michigan who have united their academic endeavors and athletic energies in the prestigious Mid-American Conference. Sister institutions Eastern Michigan and Western Michigan also belong. Northern Illinois and Ball State were added in 1973 as the MAC expanded into Indiana and Illinois. Ohio representatives include Miami University, Kent State, Bowling Green, Toledo and charter member Ohio University. The Mid-American Conference began in 1946 with five members. The 1973-74 campaign marked the first time ten schools had competed for any MAC title.

The conference headquarters is in Columbus, Ohio, in the Railroad Savings and Loan Building, 2000 West Henderson Road. Commissioner Fred Jacoby, who was appointed early in 1971, is assisted by Harry Paidas and a secretarial staff.

The Mid-American Conference first sponsored women's championships in 1980-81. Beginning in 1982-83, the MAC sponsors eight men's and eight women's championships with the membership required to compete for six championships in each classification. The conference is classified in NCAA Division I for both men's and women's athletics. In football the MAC is listed as a Division I-AA conference but has indicated its intentions to regain I-A status. The league football champion is automatically invited to the California Bowl at Fresno, Calif., to face the Pacific Coast Athletic Association champion. All other MAC members are eligible to participate in any other bowl. The men's basketball and baseball playoff winners automatically advance to the NCAA post-season tournaments as do the volleyball and women's basketball champions.

Other conference sports include men's wrestling, outdoor track, tennis, golf and swimming; women's cross country, swimming, gymnastics, tennis, outdoor track and softball. CMU does not compete in swimming.

Academic excellence is also spotlighted with the selection of a male and female Scholar-Athlete-of-the-Year at each conference



school and by the faculty athletic representatives' naming of the MAC All-Academic Teams in football, men's and women's basketball and baseball.


The MAC scholarship limits are 118 for men: football, 75; basketball, 15; baseball and track, 8 each; wrestling, 4; golf and tennis, 2 each. Women's scholarships number 34: basketball, 12; volleyball and softball, 11 each.

## Sports Medicine Staff Sees to Conditioning, Injuries

Sports medicine care and training at CMU are directed and coordinated by Ken Kopke, a 13-year member of the sports medicine staff at Central and an active member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association.

The football team's training staff is led by John Mason, head men's trainer, assisted by two graduate assistants,

Greg McGillvary and Glenn Brickey, and five seniors: Amy Disher, Lakeview; Geoff Downs, Grand Rapids; Tim Gibson, Clare; Mike Lurvey, Northville; Marge Rausch, Dearborn.

The student football trainers undertake extensive duties, including pre-practice and pre-game tapings, conditioning (including both weight-watching and weight-lifting), rehabilitation and post-injury care, creation of pads for protecting injuries, paperwork on injury treatment, therapy and followup.

During games, the trainers are responsible for "sideline care," anticipating the needs of Mason and Keating in injury situations, checking on player injuries and providing fluids and foods which include oranges, Chip-ade and soft drinks.

Thomas M. Keating, M.D., an orthopaedic surgeon in Mt. Pleasant since 1975, has been team physician for all men's and women's athletic squads. He is a member of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons (AAOS) and the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine (AOSSM). He holds an A.B. degree in history from Georgetown University and an M.D. degree from the University of Michigan. He trained in orthopaedics at the U. of M. Medical Center, and was an instructor in orthopaedics at the U. of M. Medical School.

Louie Doughty, member of the CMU family since 1969, manages the Shorts stadium football equipment room. He is assisted by two seniors, Dave Pawlak of Monroe and Tim Williams of Middleton, who will finish their respective four years of service to the football team after the 1983 spring practice.

"With the cost of equipment, you have to run the equipment room like a business," explains Pawlak, a major in business. "Do-

ing this job, you learn a lot of responsibility. You have to be an organizer."

CMU's football team runs on its organized equipment — 15 to 20 pieces of equipment per player. Since the team numbers approximately 125 players, there are 2,500 pieces of equipment to be inventoried, laundered, repaired, stored, packed for away games and replaced on the player's shelf. The 2,500 pieces of equipment include shirts, pants, socks, shoes, supporters, helmets, knee pads, thigh pads, hip pads, shoulder pads, elbow pads, hand pads and gloves.

Because every player has specific preferences as to size of helmet, size and style of pads and style of face mask, the equipment room men have created a new inventory sheet for each player. The sheets specify all the player's preferences so that the correct equipment is always ready for his use.

The laundering of 125 uniforms and towels after every practice and game is handled in the Rose Center equipment room by other members of the University's equipment staff. Led by senior equipment manager Dan Bookey, the staff includes Roy Rudolph and Jim Powell, equipment managers, and 15-18 student aides.

Doughty has developed two techniques for speeding up work in the football equipment room. All pieces of a player's practice uniform are laundered in a single bag, which is tagged by player name and number. This idea speeds up the handling of hundreds of items and minimizes the number of lost pieces. Also, every player has in the equipment room a "game shelf" upon which is stored every piece of equipment that particular player needs for playing in a game. To pack for away games, the equipment staff merely empties each player's shelf into his respective travel bag. Even with his time- and energy-saving methods, Doughty claims it takes three days to pack for game trips.

The equipment room staff works for football nearly year-round. Doughty's assistants arrive on campus one week before the players do. After the playing season is completed, the equipment must be laundered, repaired, inventoried and readied for spring practice. Once spring ball is done, the cycle is repeated in preparation for the fall season.

On the days of two practices prior to the start of school and on Labor Day, the three staff members work in the equipment room from 6 to 10 a.m. and from 1 to 6:30 p.m. Once classes begin with a single practice each day, the equipment staff works from 1 to 6 p.m. On a home-game Saturday, they start at 10:30 a.m. and finish up around 4:30 p.m. In addition, Doughty travels with the team to away games to ensure the safe arrival back at Shorts stadium of the 800 pieces of equipment that went on the road.

W.B. "BILL" BOYDEN  
1911-1980

The Bill Boyden Leadership Award was established in honor and in memory of W. B. ("Bill") Boyden through a trust fund created by his family and friends. Bill Boyden was graduated from Central in 1935. Throughout his lifetime, he demonstrated a unique blend of athletic ability, leadership, concern and involvement in community activities, business acumen and participation in the arts.

During his student career at Central, Bill earned recognition for his athletic ability by being named Most Valuable Backfield Man in his senior year of varsity football and setting a Central Michigan record for the 100-yard dash in track, which he held for several years. Fulfilling a primary role on campus, he was elected President of the Student Council. His interest in the arts and his acting talents, led to his participation in campus dramatic productions.

Following graduation, and before embarking on a successful business career, Bill spent a rewarding year teaching and coaching baseball and basketball at Peck High School in the Thumb Area of Michigan.

His lifetime of civic activities and accomplishments in his home town of Muskegon, Michigan, saw him in a number of responsible and honored positions, including terms as President of the Greater Muskegon YMCA, Rotary Club and Salvation Army Board. Bill served on the Board of Trustees and was for many years an inspirational lay reader of the First Congregational Church of Muskegon.



## THE BILL BOYDEN LEADERSHIP AWARD

An activity in which Bill Boyden took particular pride and toward which he directed considerable time and energy was the service to his beloved alma mater. He was a long-time member of the Central Michigan University Development Fund Board, including two terms as chairman and was again serving as vice chairman at the time of his death in April of 1980. As a member of the Development Fund Board of Directors, Bill was the motivating force in making possible the construction of the beautiful and impressive football stadium which thousands of Chippewa fans now enjoy. The reality of a major football stadium at Central Michigan University was a dream come true and a very proud moment for Bill when the facility was dedicated on November 4, 1972.

The Bill Boyden Leadership Award winner will be selected each spring from all "C" letter winners who are completing their junior year. The award will be presented at halftime of the opening home football game.

The Boyden Award seeks to honor that junior student of satisfactory academic standing who has best combined participation in a varsity intercollegiate sport with leadership ability in campus affairs and activities, interest or accomplishments in the arts and community involvement and who is and will be an exemplary representative of the University.

The recipient will receive a minimum of \$1,500, upon graduation, for continuance of education or furtherance of career goals. The award winner will also have his or her name inscribed on the plaque located in the Rose Arena and will also receive a permanent individual plaque.

The selection committee and Central Michigan University proudly announce that Terri McFarland of Holland is the recipient of the second Bill Boyden Leadership Award. She is the daughter of Armour and Siola McFarland. As a guard for the women's basketball team, McFarland was the fourth leading scorer, averaging 9.5 points per game. As the first baseman for the nationally-ranked, championship softball squad, she was the third-leading hitter (.283) on the 51-12 team that finished fourth at the AIAW National Championship. A mathematics and secondary education major, the West Ottawa High School graduate carries a 3.54 grade point average (4.0 scale). Her career goal is to teach math and coach basketball on the secondary school level.



# Welcome to Perry Shorts Stadium

Welcome to Perry Shorts Stadium. We hope you enjoy your visit and will return often to Central Michigan University. The following information is offered to assist you in utilizing the stadium's services and facilities.

### SEATING

During football games all the seats on the east sideline (behind the CMU team bench) are for the use of Central's students on a first-come, first-served basis. The seating behind the south end zone is for general admission ticket holders and any overflow from the student seating section.

All reserved ticket seats, including season tickets, are in the west stands (behind visiting team's bench). The sections are identified by aisles, lettered A-H, with Aisle A at the north end. Rows are numbered 1-36, starting at field level. Seats 1-14 are to the left of the aisle, 15-28 to the right.

### GOLDEN SEATS

In order to stimulate fund-raising for the \$1.5 million campaign that helped pay for the stadium, a Golden Seat section was created under the press box. Tickets in this sheltered area are lettered CC, DD, EE, FF and numbered rows 37-42. The 410 seats are sold on a season-ticket basis only and are restricted to those CMU boosters who contributed \$600 per seat during the stadium building campaign.

### TICKETS

Tickets are sold Monday through Friday in the ticket office at the Dan Rose Center, adjacent to the stadium. On game days, the stadium ticket booths open at 10 a.m. General admission tickets are always sold on game days plus any unsold reserved seats. Tickets for future home games will be on sale at the stadium booths immediately after the home games. The top prices are \$8 for reserved and \$5 for general admission. Some road game tickets can be purchased during the week at the Rose Center ticket office. For additional ticket information, call (517) 774-3041 Monday through Friday.

### EMERGENCY AID

Authorized personnel are on duty to render emergency medical treatment in the first aid room which is located behind the south concession stand under the press box. Doctors may use the telephone in the first aid room to respond to emergency calls. Central Michigan Community Hospital has an ambulance crew on standby duty at all home games.

### LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found items should be turned in or reported at the south concession stand during the game. After the game, CMU's public safety office, corner of East Campus Drive and Preston Street, will accept these items and reports. Individuals who are separated from their companions should plan on reuniting just inside the stadium's north entrances either during the halftime or immediately after the game.

### EMERGENCY ANNOUNCEMENTS

Emergency public address announcements only should be brought to the south entrance of the press box.

### REST ROOMS

Public rest rooms are available in the service buildings behind the stands on both sides of the field. The entrances to the rest rooms are on the sides away from the playing field.

### PUBLIC TELEPHONES

Pay telephones are available behind the service buildings on each side of the field.


### CONCESSION STANDS

Food, drink and souvenirs may be purchased at the concession stands at each end of the service buildings on both sides of the field. Administered by the University's Food Services, the stands are augmented by soft drink booths at the southeast and southwest corners of the stadium.


### BACKGROUND

CMU's football home is named after the late R. Perry Shorts, a Central alumnus who played on the 1899 team and through his industriousness and intelligence became a banking and civic leader in Saginaw. He established scholarships at the University in his sisters' names. As the University's oldest living football letterman, he spoke briefly but enthusiastically during the stadium dedication ceremonies in November, 1972. The Chippewas defeated Illinois State, 28-21, that day.

The stadium features the first collegiate Astro Turf playing surface in the state, has more than 20,000 permanent seats, can easily accommodate an additional 5,000 temporary bleachers and has been utilized for numerous activities in addition to football practice and games.



Three graduate aides will assist the 1982 CMU football coaching staff.

Tom Kearly, a 1979 graduate of Winona (MN) State where he was co-captain and an all-league quarterback, has returned for a second year of working with the defensive secondary under Denny LaFleur. Kearly is earning his master's degree in athletic administration and plans to graduate in May, 1983. An outstanding athlete at Hancock (MI) Central High School, Tom is the son of the legendary coach at Michigan Technological Institute, Ted Kearly.

A 1980 CMU graduate and defensive tackle, Joe Brandell is helping Mike Poff with the offensive line. A former Mt. Pleasant Sacred Heart noseguard and tackle, Brandell coached at SHA 1978-79 and at East Grand Rapids in 1980, volunteered his help with the Chippewas' defensive line last season and coached track at Ionia last spring. He is working on his master's degree in physical education and will graduate in May, 1983.

Keith Otterbein, 1979 Hillsdale College graduate and linebacker, is working with the tight ends at CMU this season. He has

been coaching football and working on fundraising at Hillsdale for three years. He is working toward his master's degree in athletic administration and will graduate next May. Otterbein's wife, Amy, is a graduate of the University of Michigan and works at Central Michigan Community Hospital.

CMU's graduate assistants are responsible for analyzing game films, preparing computer analyses and printouts and developing the scout teams which provide practice competition for the varsity team members.

## MAC and PCAA Aim for California Bowl II, Dec. 18

The champions of the 1982 Mid-American Conference and Pacific Coast Athletic Association will meet in the second California Bowl Saturday, Dec. 18, at Fresno in the 30,000-seat Fresno State University Bulldog Stadium.

The inaugural California Bowl last year pitted Toledo against San Jose State in a 27-25 thriller won in the closing minute by the MAC representative.

The sponsoring agency of the bowl game is the Greater San Joaquin Valley Sports Association. The Valley Children's Hospital and Guidance Clinic is the official charitable beneficiary. In addition, a \$100,000 guarantee is given to each of the participating teams.

The Mizlou and ESPN television networks will televise this year's game nationally. The California Bowl II activities

will include a week of cultural and sporting events with the competing teams arriving on the Sunday or Monday preceding the Bowl game.

The football-playing members of the PCAA are California State-Fullerton, California State-Long Beach, Fresno State, San Jose State, University of the Pacific, Utah State and Nevada-Las Vegas.

The nine MAC teams who do not earn their way to California Bowl II are free to accept a bid to any other NCAA-sanctioned bowl game. In 1982 the PCAA is classified as NCAA Division 1-A, the MAC as Division 1-AA. CMU and Toledo are individually classified 1-A. The MAC is committed to making a determined effort to attain a 1-A classification for 1983.

The ten MAC schools will each receive an allotment of bowl-game tickets, with the league champion receiving a major share.





## Western's Harbaugh Drives Broncos



JACK HARBAUGH

Jack Harbaugh, a former assistant in both the Pacific 10 and Big 10 Conferences, became the 11th head football coach in Western Michigan University football history in December 1981.

In 1980 and 1981, Jack served as defensive coordinator at Stanford University. He earlier was defensive backfield coach at the University of

Michigan (1973-79) during which time the Wolverines won five Big 10 titles.

The 43-year-old Harbaugh also coached secondaries at Iowa (1971-72), Bowling Green (1968-71) and Morehead State (1967).

Three of his former collegians, David Brown and Don Dufek of Michigan and Iowa's Craig Clemons, earned All-American honors. Clemons later performed with the Chicago Bears and the Michigan duo is now playing with the Seattle Seahawks.

## MEMORIES...

30 Years Ago: October 11, 1952  
Central 27, Western Illinois 0

The Chippewas recorded the first of five consecutive victories by defeating the Leathernecks of Western Illinois, 27-0.

The win makes the Chippewas the only undefeated team in the Interstate Conference with a 2-0 record (3-2 overall).

Lonnie Kerr leads Central's offense and celebrates his first start at quarterback by connecting on four of eight passes, including a touchdown strike of 25 yards. Meanwhile, the stingy Chippewa defense holds the Leathernecks in check, allowing them past the Central 35-yard-line only once.

Central goes on to conquer the rest of its opponents and capture its first IAC championship with an unblemished 6-0 conference record.

"Jack has a broad coaching background from the Midwest, South and the West Coast and has an excellent knowledge of the passing game," said WMU Athletic Director Tom Wonderling at the time of his appointment.

Harbaugh is a 1961 graduate of Bowling Green and played quarterback and defensive back in football and was a baseball outfielder.

Jack was drafted and tried out with the Buffalo Bills of the then American Football League.

A native of Crestline, Ohio, Harbaugh was an All-State quarterback and shortstop and was picked to play in the 1957 Ohio East-West game.

After graduation, Harbaugh spent five years in Ohio high school coaching. He was an assistant at Perrysburg (1962-63) before guiding Eaton High to a 11-9-1 record in two seasons after inheriting a team that had won just one game in the previous two years.

He then spent 1966 at Xenia High and directed that club to a 8-1 record and the Western Ohio League Championship.

In 1964, Jack received a master's degree in health and physical education from Bowling Green.

Jack and his wife, Jackie, have three children — John, 20; Jim, 19; and Joani, 14. John is a junior defensive back at Miami University and Jim will be a freshman quarterback at Michigan this fall.





## CMU vs Western Michigan...

Two pre-season contenders for Mid-American Conference (MAC) honors go heads-up at Perry Shorts Stadium with the winner staying in the thick of things and the loser falling well behind.

Central Michigan University and Western Michigan University, combatants on the gridiron since 1907, enter the 1:30 p.m. contest with one loss each in MAC play. Two losses may be fatal in each team's bid for a berth in the California Bowl.

CMU, on the heels of a 13-8 triumph over Eastern Michigan University, is 1-1 in conference play and 2-2 for the season. WMU, a 7-3 loser at Bowling Green last week, is also 1-1 in the MAC. The Broncos are 3-1 overall.

Western Michigan got off to a fast start under first-year coach Jack Harbaugh, rolling to victories over Grand Valley State (28-3), Marshall (34-0) and Kent State (24-14) before the unsuccessful trek to Bowling Green.

Harbaugh, 43, was the defensive coordinator at Stanford University for two seasons before replacing Elliot Zuzelac at WMU. He served as the defensive backfield coach at the University of Michigan from 1973-79 during which time the Wolverines won five Big 10 titles.

The Broncos feature a balanced, explosive attack despite the three points against Bowling Green. However, a knee injury to starting quarterback Scott Smith in the Kent State game has slowed the WMU attack. Smith is listed as questionable for today's clash.

Freshman Chris Conklin from Jackson Lumen Christi had an outstanding game in Smith's place at Bowling Green. He completed a school record 20 passes in 31 attempts for 214 yards, and is 24 of 35 for 270 yards this season. Smith is 32 of 61 for 408 yards and three TDs. Smith's father, incidentally, played football at Central Michigan.


Regardless of who's throwing the ball, senior split end Bob Phillips has shown a tremendous ability to catch it. He's caught 15 aerials for 250

yards and two TDs. Phillips is also listed as questionable for today's game because of painful rib injuries.

Western Michigan has the ability to move the ball on the ground, but the Broncos are hurting at tailback, too.

Top rusher, sophomore Cliff Reed, missed the Bowling Green game with rib injuries and is questionable for today. He's gained 292 yards in 55 tries. Junior Shawn Faulkner has carried 71 times for 333 yards and figures to get the start against the Chippewas. Reed runs the 40-yard dash in 4.5 seconds and Faulkner in 4.6.

Senior Matt Meares (6-2, 211) anchors the Bronco offensive line from his center post.

Bob DeMarco, the rifle-armed junior from Monroe, enters the game as the seventh-leading passer in CMU history. He could finish the game in fifth. DeMarco has 1,943 yards while Mike Franckowiak is at 2,051 and Ron Rummel 1,993.


Sophomore standout Curtis Adams should be ready to go at tailback against WMU after missing the past two outings with a leg injury. The 6-1, 185-pounder rushed for 279 yards in his first two games. However, sophomore Calvin Robinson, the starter at EMU underwent knee surgery Monday and is probably out for the season. He was second on the team in rushing with 143 yards.

Central Michigan defense has had luck rotating players on its front line, using the trio of senior middle guard John Johnson and junior tackles Pat Brackett and Mike Mills in certain plays and the bigger threesome of sophomore Duane Woods, and juniors Mike Murley and Ron Kraft on others. Johnson was tabbed player of the game for the defense against Bowling Green and Kraft against East Carolina.

Western Michigan is only one of a handful of teams to hold a lead the all-time series with the Chippewas. Although CMU has won the last five in a row including a 15-13 triumph at WMU last season, the Broncos hold a 34-17 advantage with one tie.







# Don Peddie Coordinates CMU's Offense

Becoming seriously involved in sports as early as junior high school, assistant coach Don Peddie has made a career of his favorite pastime. Peddie was awarded a football athletic scholarship upon high school graduation and was recruited as a running back by University of Miami's John Pont. Peddie spent three of his four years at that school under the direction of Bo Schembechler, who replaced Pont.

Peddie was team captain for the Miami University squad during his senior year and remained at the campus as a graduate assistant to coach the freshman team the following year.

Lining up coaching and teaching positions in Elyria, OH., and later Brooklyn, OH., Peddie was able to expand his expertise in the field.

He advanced to the college ranks within a short period, and served as offensive backfield coach at Southwest Missouri University in Springfield for two years.

Peddie came to Central Michigan University under Roy Kramer twelve years ago to accept a combination teaching/coaching position.

Peddie's offensive philosophy centers on maintaining possession of the football. "We want to pass when we want to. We have to stretch the defense by maintaining the offensive game with a strong inside running game," he said. In the long run, Peddie's offensive goal is "keeping the defense off the field as much as possible."

To accomplish his goal, Peddie places a great deal of importance on the psychological development of his players.

"It starts each Monday and is followed up on all week through," Peddie said.

It is not enough for the team to have a goal as a whole. "The players need individual goals," Peddie said. "We tell them that studies have to be No. 1 and football No. 2. Everything else has to go on that third burner. The players have all done well in that aspect."

The coaches have to work with the players' overall team attitude as well. "They have to be 'up' for each game," Peddie said. "None of the games can be taken lightly."

Peddie says that Head Coach Herb Deromedi's coaching style helps. "He's always very positive, very thorough," he said. "The coaches work together as a staff and combine their thoughts in order to put together plays we can handle."

Coming up with the winning combination goes back to recruiting techniques. "We recruit the type of offense we want," Peddie noted. "Then when we get home with those players, we have to gear our offense to the personnel we've recruited."

Coaching has kept Don Peddie "feeling young," and sports in general seem to be a large share of his life off campus. Peddie encourages his children to participate. "There are great carry-over values," he said. "They'll learn how to win graciously, and lose . . . with some poise."

Peddie serves on the board of the Mt. Pleasant Girls' Softball Association and spends part of each summer coaching girls' softball and Little League, in which his own children are team members.

Peddie and his wife Barbara, who teaches all styles of dance at CMU, enjoy living in Michigan and make use of its many lakes. The entire family spends hot summer days swimming and waterskiing.

The Peddie's have two children, Dawn, 15, and Jade, 10.

## MEMORIES...

55 Years Ago: October 22, 1927  
Central 18, Western 12

After a scoreless first quarter, the Chippewas put points on the board every quarter thereafter to take an 18-12 victory from Western State (now Western Michigan).

The win is the first ever in the intra-state rivalry that started in 1907. Jack Cline is the workhorse for Central, carrying the ball on exactly half the plays run by the Bearcats.

On Central's first drive for paydirt it's all Cline. The four-year letterman returns the kickoff 30 yards, grabs two passes, and scampers in for the touchdown to make the score 6-6.

Cline scores a second TD after Bill Kelly breaks up a Western pass play, forcing it to punt.

In the fourth quarter, Central takes advantage of Hilltopper penalties to keep its drive alive. Jimmy Knapp goes around left end for the final Bearcat score of the day.






**STEVEN KOLLER—NO. 75**
