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

AROUND THE MAC

Seven games featuring Mid-American Conference teams dot today's college football schedule. By the conclusion of this Saturday, every MAC team will have at least a game under its belt.

Today's lone conference tilt will take place in Muncie, Ind. as Ball State hosts Miami. It will be the season opener for the Redskins, who were picked to finish fourth in the 1985 league race by the media. Ball State, under first year coach Paul Schudel, has been tagged to finish in the cellar this season and opened its season last Saturday with a 31-6 loss to pre-season favorite Bowling Green State.

The MAC will have a great deal at stake in terms of prestige today with key games against solid programs from other conferences.

The Chippewas have an opportunity to send a message to the Pacific Coast Athletic Association with their game against Pacific. The champions of the PCAA and MAC will meet in the fifth Annual California Bowl on Dec. 14 in Fresno and today's game is an early barometer of the league's relative strengths. Central is picked to place second in the MAC; Pacific is slated for a sixth-place finish in the eight-team PCAA.

Most notable of the five other MAC-related games today are the Western Michigan at Army, Bowling Green at Kentucky and Northern Illinois at Wisconsin clashes.

Western dropped a 17-0 decision to Northern Illinois last Saturday, but has an opportunity to right itself with a big win against a major independent. Incidentally, Army defeated Michigan State in last season's Cherry Bowl contest and the Broncos will lock horns with MSU on September 28.

Bowling Green launched its bid for the MAC title with a solid 31-6 win over Ball State last week and has been looking forward to this contest against Southeastern Conference power Kentucky

for some time. The Falcons are given a chance based on the Brian McClure-led, high-powered offense and a defense boasting nine returning starters from last year's squad.

Northern Illinois, 1-0 on the season, starts its odyssey of three consecutive games against Big Ten competition with its Madison tussle. The Huskies of first-year coach Jerry Pettibone will be on the road next weekend against Iowa and the following Saturday against Northwestern.

Finally, Ohio and new coach Cleve Bryant open the season at Marshall and Kent State travels to Akron to complete today's MAC football offerings.

HALL OF FAME DATE AHEAD

Seven former Central Michigan University standouts will be feted on Saturday, Sept. 21, at the Bovee University Center when the annual Athletic Hall of Fame banquet is held.

A social hour will begin at 5:30 p.m. and the banquet at 6:30 p.m. Tickets cost \$15 and may be purchased at the Rose Ticket Office. Deadline for purchasing tickets is Sept. 16.

The 1985 class will be the second to be inducted, and will feature current National Basketball Association star Dan Roundfield of the Washington Bullets.

Also to be inducted are: Lyle Bennett, former coach and athlete for the Chippewas; Bill Kelly, former coach and athlete; Walt Beach, football and track star; Dutch Lodewyk, football, baseball and basketball star; Tom Minkel, current assistant wrestling coach at CMU and former wrestling standout and Jack Cline, former football, basketball, baseball and track athlete.

CHIP NOTES

Central Head Coach Herb Deromedi enters the 1985 season ranked sixth in the nation among Division I-A coaches in career winning percentage. His 57-13-3 record (.760) places him behind Oklahoma's Barry Switzer (.824), Nebraska's Tom Osborne (.810), Penn State's Joe Paterno (.801), Michigan's Bo Schembechler (.768) and Clemson's Danny Ford (.768).

In the seven season openers under Deromedi, Central shows a 5-2 record with the only losses against Pacific by a 10-3 count in 1981 and to Kentucky by a 31-14 margin in 1983. Both losses came on the road.

Four CMU grid contests will be seen on the Pro-Am Sports System (PASS) this season. The four contests, all to be shown on a delayed basis, are against Western Michigan (to be aired on October 14), Eastern Michigan (Oct. 28), Toledo (Nov. 11) and Northern Illinois (Nov. 24).

The Chippewas return fewer starters from last season than any other MAC team. Of the 24 possible positions (11 on offense and defense, a punter and a kicker), the Chippewas have 11 incumbent starters. Miami tops the list with 18 followed by Ball State and Bowling Green (17 each), Eastern Michigan and Western Michigan (16 each), Northern Illinois and Ohio (15 each) and Kent State and Toledo (12 each).

PLAYER PROFILE



TONY BROWN — NO. 5
5-11, 207 Pounds, Tailback

After two years of playing behind the leading ground gainer in Central Michigan University history, Tony Brown is prepared to set aside the large shadow of Curtis Adams.

Brown, a 1981 graduate of Flint Northern High School, is expected to be a key in the 1985 Chippewa offensive attack. He steps into the tailback spot where Adams gained 4,162 career rushing yards.

Brown hasn't been idle since transferring from the University of Minnesota. He rushed for 442 yards on 71 carries in 1983, and 483 yards on 81 carries a season ago.

Included are two 100-plus yard games against two key rivals. In 1983 Brown gained 139 yards in a game against Eastern Michigan. Last year, against Western Michigan, Brown exploded for 182 yards, including an 83-yard scoring sprint.

Brown understands that he is going to be compared to Adams. "They are going to say that Curtis did this and that, but Curtis is gone, and I'm the one now," Brown said. "I'm going to do my best Saturday after Saturday."


"Curtis is a good running back, and he had a great career here," Brown continued. "I learned a lot of things (from Adams), and it made me a better ball player."

Brown will be playing strictly tailback in 1985, after seeing action at tailback and fullback the last two years. He will also be used as a receiver out of the backfield.

"I catch the ball pretty good," he said with a smile. "Receiving the ball is just as important as taking a hand-off. It's one of my plusses."

Brown, from a family of seven children, is just six credits short of graduation. He is a recreation major.

KEVIN KOLCHEFF — NO. 9
6-3, 195 Pounds, Safety

There is one thing that Kevin Kolcheff will never be accused of lacking, and that is confidence.

Kolcheff, a fifth-year senior from Trenton High School, exudes confidence all of the time. He will see action at strong safety in 1985, and he is also a leader of the special teams.

In the past, he has backed up people like Jim Bowman and Mike Kenealy in the defensive backfield. Sitting and watching others play is tough on all athletes, but it is especially tough on somebody with Kolcheff's personality.

"I've moved all over the place. I've been in the shadow of guys like Bowman and Kenealy," he said, "if somebody went down (to injury) I'm in. It's hard to accept."

He is proud of his special teams work. One of Kolcheff's top memories is of his freshman season on special teams.

"I made the traveling squad, and on the opening kick-off I made an awesome hit," Kolcheff said. "It was just a great game for me, my whole family was in the stands."


Kolcheff enjoyed his best season in 1984. In addition to 20 solo tackles and 11 assists, he intercepted a Brian McClure pass against Bowling Green, and recovered a fumble.

He says that he has great respect for the Central Michigan coach staff, and that he would like to get into coaching.

"From Coach (Denny) LaFleur you couldn't ask for anything more," Kolcheff said. "He's more than a coach. He's a friend and a great guy. And, Coach Deromedi has been a great influence on me."

Kolcheff is a journalism major, and would like to get into secondary education. His brother Don is a freshman on this year's football squad. He lists his parents, girlfriend Pam Baase, and his sister Caroline, as people who are a positive influence on him.

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
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The trombones cover the tenor voice along with the bass

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Welcome to Kelly/Shorts Stadium

Welcome to Kelly/Shorts Stadium. We hope you enjoy your visit and will return often to Central Michigan University. The following information is offered to assist you in utilizing the stadium's services and facilities.

SEATING

During football games all the seats on the east sideline (behind the CMU team bench) are for general admission use on a first-come, first-served basis. The seating behind the south end zone is for general admission ticket holders and any overflow from the student seating section. There is some reserved seating available in the south end zone.

All reserved ticket seats, including season tickets, are in the west stands (behind visiting team's bench). The sections are identified by aisles, lettered A-N, with Aisle A at the north end. Each section is divided by an aisle with seats 1-14 on the left side of the aisle and 15-28 on the right side of the aisle.

CENTURY CLUB SEATING

The Century Club, one of the university's strongest financial support groups, offers its members priority seating. As marked below in the shaded sections, Aisle C, D, E, and rows 1-36 are reserved for Century Club persons who purchase season tickets. For additional information, call (517) 774-3045, Monday through Friday.

TICKETS

Tickets are sold Monday through Friday in the ticket office at the Dan Rose Center, adjacent to the stadium. On game days, the stadium ticket booths open at 10 a.m. General admission tickets are always sold on game days plus any unsold reserved seats. Tickets for future home games will be on sale at the stadium booths immediately after the home games. The top prices are \$8 for reserved and \$5 for general admission. Some road game tickets can be purchased during the week at the Rose Center ticket office. For additional ticket information, call (517) 774-3045 Monday through Friday.

EMERGENCY AID

Authorized personnel are on duty to render emergency medical treatment in the first aid room which is located behind the south concession stand under the press box. Doctors may use the telephone in the first aid room to respond to emergency calls. Central Michigan Community Hospital has an ambulance crew on standby duty at all home games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found items should be turned in or reported at the south concession stand during the game. After the game, CMU's public safety office, corner of East Campus Drive and Preston Street, will accept these items and reports. Individuals who are separated from their companions should plan on reuniting just inside the stadium's north entrances either during the halftime or immediately after the game.

EMERGENCY ANNOUNCEMENTS

Emergency public address announcements only should be brought to the south entrance of the press box.

REST ROOMS

Public rest rooms are available in the service buildings behind the stands on both sides of the field. The entrances to the rest rooms are on the sides away from the playing field.

PUBLIC TELEPHONES

Pay telephones are available behind the service buildings on each side of the field.

CONCESSION STANDS

Food, drink and souvenirs may be purchased at the concession stands at each end of the service buildings on both sides of the field. Administered by the University's Food Services, the stands are augmented by soft drink booths at the southeast and southwest corners of the stadium.


KELLY/SHORTS STADIUM HISTORY

Kelly/Shorts Stadium, the home of Central Michigan University football, opened in 1972.

The stadium was originally named Shorts Stadium in honor of R. Perry Shorts, a 1900 graduate of Central Michigan, who went on to a distinguished banking career in Saginaw.

In June of 1983, the CMU Board of Trustees voted to rename the stadium Kelly/Shorts Stadium in honor of Kenneth (Bill) Kelly. Kelly coached the Chippewa football team from 1951 to 1966. Compiling a record of 91-58-2, he is the winningest football coach in CMU history.

The stadium received a facelift of sorts prior to the 1983 season as a new wall-to-wall Astro Turf playing surface was installed to replace the surface that had covered the stadium floor since the 1972 opening. Half of the cost of the \$525,000 Astro Turf carpet came from private donations.



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
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
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Michigan Media Provide Vital Coverage

The Mid-American Conference

Central Michigan University is one of ten major mid-western universities in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Michigan who have united their academic endeavors and athletic energies in the prestigious Mid-American Conference. Sister institutions Eastern Michigan and Western Michigan also belong. Northern Illinois and Ball State were added in 1973 as the MAC expanded into Indiana and Illinois. Ohio representatives include Miami University, Kent State, Bowling Green, Toledo and charter member Ohio University. The Mid-American Conference began in 1946 with five members. The 1973-74 campaign marked the first time the schools had competed for any MAC title.

The conference headquarters is located in Toledo, Ohio. The address is Four Seagate, Suite 501, Toledo, OH 43604. The league commissioner is Jim Lessig, who was appointed on Nov. 1, 1982 and is assisted by Allan Chamberlin.

The Mid-American Conference first sponsored women's championships in 1980-81. Beginning in 1982-83, the MAC sponsors eight men's and eight women's championships with the membership required to compete for six championships in each classification. The conference is classified in NCAA Division I for both men's and women's athletics. In football the MAC is listed as a Division I-A. The league football champion is automatically invited to the California Bowl at Fresno, Calif., to face the Pacific Coast Athletic Association champion. All other MAC members are eligible to participate in any other bowl. The men's basketball and baseball playoff winners automatically advance to the NCAA post-season tournaments as do the volleyball and women's basketball champions.

Other conference sports include: MEN, wrestling, outdoor track, tennis, golf, swimming, and cross country; WOMEN, cross country, swimming, gymnastics, tennis, field hockey, outdoor track and softball.

Academic excellence is also spotlighted with the selection of a male and female Scholar-Athlete-of-the-Year at each conference school and by the faculty athletic representatives' naming of the MAC All-Academic Teams in football, men's and women's basketball and baseball.



The MAC has scholarship limits in several sports for both men's and women's athletics. The sports with set scholarship limits for men are football (80), basketball (15), baseball and track (eight each), wrestling golf and tennis (two each). The specified sports for women are basketball (15), volleyball (12) and softball (11).

MAC, PCAA TEAMS SET SIGHT ON FIFTH CALIFORNIA BOWL



The Fresno State University Bulldogs Stadium is the site of the annual California Bowl, scheduled for December 14 this year, which will feature a highly-competitive game between the champions of the Mid-American Conference and the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

After three years of exciting California Bowl matchups, the fourth one saw Pacific Coast Athletic Association representative Nevada-Las Vegas win easily over Toledo, 30-14. When it was discovered UNLV had used ineligible players, however, the Rockets and the Mid-American Conference were awarded the victory, the MAC's third in four years against the PCAA champion.

Toledo won the initial Cal Bowl, 27-25, over San Jose State in 1981, while Fresno State scored 22 fourth-quarter points to beat Bowling Green in 1982, 29-28. In 1983, Northern Illinois staved off a late-game drive by Fullerton State to win 20-13.

The California Bowl is played in Bulldog Stadium on the campus of Fresno State in Fresno. A total of 87,770 fans have witnessed the first four games.

The 1985 contest is scheduled for Dec. 14.

California Bowl activities include a week-long schedule for the competing teams with the Valley Children's Hospital and Guidance Clinic the official charity benefited by the game.

The football-playing members of the PCAA are: Fullerton State, Long Beach State, Fresno State, San Jose State, Pacific, Utah State and Nevada-Las Vegas.

The nine members of the MAC which don't earn a trip to the California Bowl are free to accept a bid to any other NCAA sanctioned bowl game. Both the MAC and the PCAA are classified as 1-A conferences.

Allen Returns as Public Address Voice

Dr. Richard K. (Dick) Allen of CMU's Speech and Dramatic Arts faculty returns to the Kelly/Shorts Stadium's public address system for his eighth year as full-time announcer this football season.

An avid Chippewa fan himself, Allen is known as the "Voice of the Marching Chippewa Band." For several years he has been the announcer for the band's pre-game and halftime performances at football games.

Also, Allen announces for CMU basketball games in the Rose Center and for baseball games at Alumni Field.

Allen has an appreciation for the struggles of CMU athletes since he is a long-distance runner. Running 6 to 10 miles daily, he has participated in many Michigan running events.

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



CMU vs. . .

How's Ron Fillmore's knee? Is the kicking game improved? Can the key players up the middle of the defense be replaced? Will the running game be as good without Curtis Adams?

The answers to those questions and many more will start to unfold today when Central Michigan University opens the 1985 football season against the University of Pacific. Kickoff is 1 p.m. in Kelly/Shorts Stadium.

After four weeks of drills, the Chippewas are anxiously looking forward to launching their 85th season — one veteran head coach Herb Deromedi calls "challenging."

Despite losing 19 lettermen and 13 starters from last season's 8-2-1 club, Central Michigan was picked a surprising second in the Mid-American Conference (MAC) by the media. "The vote must have been based on tradition because we lost a number of outstanding players," said Deromedi. "But, we also have some excellent players back and some young kids with playing time."

Pacific, under third-year coach Bob Cope, got a jump on the Chippewas last Saturday and rolled to a 49-17 win over Sacramento State. The Tigers forced eight turnovers (five interceptions and three fumble recoveries).

"Pacific is a very formidable opponent," said Deromedi. "It has excellent team speed, and will use a different offensive and defensive scheme than we're used to."


The Tigers have employed the "Wishbone" offense — a type of option attack with three backs. They also use a 4-4-3 alignment on defense.

Fall practice has helped answer part of the lingering questions for the Chippewas and the rest will be answered as the season progresses.

Fillmore, the 6-3 junior quarterback who missed the final nine games of '84 with a knee injury, will get the nod at that position against Pacific after a relentless rehabilitation program paid big dividends.

As far as the kicking game goes, Deromedi is encouraged and figures that sophomores Lance Loughman (a transfer from the University of Cincinnati) and Brian Tierney will do a good job placekicking and senior Brian McPherson and freshman Chris Givens a solid job punting.

The Chippewa defense lost the entire middle six from

tackles to linebacker to safeties. While still an area of concern, juniors Ben Castle (6-3, 249) and Nick Johnson (6-1, 235) have claimed the tackle slots, junior Mike Bruns (6-3, 220) and soph Chris Wise (6-1, 215) the inside linebacking spots and junior Tony Elliott and soph Joe Kellogg the safeties. Elliott started at cornerback last season.

There's no doubt in the coach's mind that senior Tony Brown, a 5-11, 207-pounder, will be a top-notch tailback for the Chippewas. He has gained 917 yards in the last two years as a reserve behind Adams, now a starter for the San Diego Chargers of the NFL.

While the middle of the CMU defense is still unproven, save for two-year starter at nose guard Pete Panelli (he'll share the job this year with Ed Meyle), the outside linebacking should be second to none. A pair of fifth-year seniors, Kevin Egnatuk and Steve Sklenar, help make this position one of the team's best. Egnatuk was an all-MAC player in 1983 but missed the final eight games of '84 with a broken toe while Sklenar was all-MAC in '84.

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

The Last Time CMU, Pacific Met

Sept. 5, 1981 Pacific 10, CMU 3

It has been four years since CMU was defeated by the University of the Pacific Tigers in Stockton, Calif., but you can bet Chippewa head coach Herb Deromedi has not forgotten his team's less than inspiring performance that day.

The Chippewas fumbled the game away, coughing up the pigskin seven times en route to the season-opening defeat.

Central's lone score of the afternoon came as a result of its first possession. Placekicker Novo Bojovic booted a 32-yard field goal with 7:53 remaining in the first quarter to give CMU a 3-0 advantage.

The three-point lead held throughout the first half until the Tigers struck early in the third quarter on a 1-yard touchdown run. Pacific padded its 7-0 lead late in the fourth quarter with a 27-yard field goal that gave the Tigers a 10-3 lead with just 1:02 remaining in the game.

The game was anything but a showcase of offensive fire power. Central could only muster 177 yards total offense on the afternoon, while the Tigers only racked up 201 yards.

Chippewa tailback Willie Todd led all rushers with 76 yards on 14 carries.

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
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
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


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THE BILL BOYDEN LEADERSHIP AWARD

An activity in which Bill Boyden took particular pride and toward which he directed considerable time and energy was the service to his beloved alma mater. He was a long-time member of the Central Michigan University Development Fund Board, including two terms as chairman and was again serving as vice chairman at the time of his death in April of 1980. As a member of the Development Fund Board of Directors, Bill was the motivating force in making possible the construction of the beautiful and impressive football stadium which thousands of Chippewa fans now enjoy. The reality of a major football stadium at Central Michigan University was a dream come true and a very proud moment for Bill when the facility was dedicated on November 4, 1972.

The Bill Boyden Leadership Award winner will be selected each spring from all "C" letter winners who are completing their junior year. The award will be presented at halftime of the opening home football game.

The Boyden Award seeks to honor that junior student of satisfactory academic standing who has best combined participation in a varsity intercollegiate sport with leadership ability in campus affairs and activities, interest or accomplishments in the arts and community involvement and who is, and will be, an exemplary representative of the University.

The recipient will receive a minimum cash award of \$1,500 upon graduation from Central Michigan University, for continuance of education or furtherance of career goals.

Alternatively, should the recipient be an athlete on scholarship, the \$1,500 cash award may be directed by the winner to any selected department or project within the University, in the name of the recipient. The award winner will also have his or her name inscribed on the permanent plaque located in Rose Arena, be given an individual plaque and a special gold Boyden award lapel pin.

The selection committee and Central Michigan University proudly announce that Ken McDonald of Livonia is the fifth recipient of the Bill Boyden Leadership Award. Ken has earned three letters at CMU in soccer and enters his senior season holding every major goaltending record for the Chippewas. A tri-captain last fall, Ken set school records as a freshman for most saves in a game (19) and season (122) and as a sophomore his goals-against-average of 0.71 set a school record.

Ken carries an outstanding 3.81 grade-point-average in the classroom, majoring in journalism and broadcasting/cinematic arts. He was recently named second-team Academic All-American by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) on their at-large team.

Ken is a graduate of Livonia Stevenson High and is the son of Harry and Suzanne McDonald.





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Sports Medicine Staff Performs Integral Role

The football team's training staff is led by head men's trainer John Mason and assistant athletic trainer Greg McGillvary. Aiding the professional staff are students Jim Case, St. Clair Shores; Tanya Katschanow, Troy; Nancy Riedel, Traverse City; Bill Weaver, Farwell; and Kirsten Zekind, Fraser.

The student football trainers undertake extensive duties, including pre-practice and pre-game tapings, conditioning rehabilitation and post-injury care, creation of pads for protecting injuries, paperwork on injury treatment, therapy and followup.

During games, the trainers are responsible for "sideline care," anticipating the needs of Mason in injury situations, checking on player injuries and providing fluids and foods like oranges, Chip-ade and soft drinks.

Thomas M. Keating, M.D., an orthopaedic surgeon in Mt. Pleasant since 1975, is team physician for all men's and women's athletic squads. He is a member of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons and the American Orthopaedic Society for Sports Medicine. He holds an A.B. degree in history from Georgetown University and an M.D. degree from the University of Michigan. He trained in orthopaedics at the U-of-M Medical Center, and was an instructor in orthopaedics at the U-of-M Medical School.

Sports medicine care and training at Central Michigan University are directed and coordinated by Ken Kopke, a 16-year member of the sports medicine staff at CMU and an active member of the national Athletic Trainers Association.

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DOUGHTY HEADS EXPERIENCED CREW IN EQUIPMENT ROOM

Louie Doughty begins his 17th season as a member of the Central Michigan University athletic family. He manages the Kelly/Shorts Stadium football equipment room, and is ably assisted by seniors Scott Dumas of Scottville and Jeff Parker of Lake City, and sophomore Jim Reid of Lake City. Parker is in his fourth season, Dumas his second and Reid his first.

CMU's football team depends on the equipment staff a great deal. Since the team numbers approximately 125 players, and each player has 15-20 pieces of equipment, there are 2,500 pieces to be inventoried, laundered, repaired, stored, packed for away games and replaced on the player's shelf. The equipment includes shirts, pants, socks, shoes, supporters, helmets, knee pads, thigh pads, hip pads, shoulder pads, elbow pads, hand pads and gloves.

The laundering of 125 uniforms and towels after every practice and game is handled in the Rose Center equipment room by other members of the University's equipment staff. Directed by Dan Bookey, coordinator of equipment operations, the staff includes Roy Rudolph and Jim Powell, equipment managers and 15-18 student aides.

The equipment room staff works for football nearly year-round. Doughty's assistants arrive on campus one week before the players do. After the playing season is completed, the equipment must be laundered, repaired, inventoried and prepped for spring practice. Once spring ball is done, the cycle is repeated in preparation for the fall season.

Doughty also travels with the team to away games to ensure the safe arrival back at Kelly/Shorts Stadium of the 800 pieces of equipment that went on the road.

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

GRID GREATS SHINE IN THE CLASSROOM

Sometimes, it's the silent statistics that mean the most to a player.

Just ask Central Michigan University's Kevin Egnatuk, Steve Sklenar and John DeBoer. They will be more than happy to tell you life on campus is more than touchdowns, tackles and pass receptions.

All three are outstanding students, as well as mainstays to the Chippewa football team.

"Academics are the first thing we stress when our players come here as freshmen," said CMU head football coach Herb Deromedi. "The players are here to get an education first and we give them that opportunity. The guys like Kevin, Steve and John typify what a good student-athlete should be."

Consider these "statistics," compiled by the trio during their academic career on campus.

Egnatuk, an outside linebacker from East Lansing, carries a 3.67 grade-point-average and will graduate in December with a degree in finance. For his efforts on and off the field, Egnatuk was selected to the first team on the all-Mid-American Conference and all-MAC Academic squads and second-unit Academic All-American team by the College Sports Information Directors of America in 1983.

And although a broken toe, suffered in the Western Michigan game last year, forced Egnatuk to sit out most of the 1984 season, he was still the recipient of the Bill Boyden Award — given yearly to a CMU athlete combining academic excellence with athletic performance.

Teaming with Egnatuk at the other outside linebacker spot is Muskegon native Sklenar. He also will graduate in December — carrying a 3.82 grade-point-average in accounting. Sklenar was named to the first-team all-MAC and all-MAC Academic squads a year ago.

DeBoer, a split end from Gross Pointe, graduated in May with a 3.64 grade-point-average in accounting. Currently taking graduate classes, DeBoer hauled in 40 passes and spots on the first-team, all-MAC and third-team, All-American/Football News squads in 1984. He is also a two-time selection to the all-MAC Academic team.

So what's the secret? Egnatuk says it's nothing more than: "knuckling under and keeping your nose to the grindstone."

"From the way I was raised, my parents always instilled in me good study habits," says Egnatuk. "My father is a principal in a middle school so I know what a good education is and what it can do for you. It's a lot of work, but it's something I'll be able to look back on and be extremely proud of."

Sklenar says his father was even a wee bit more adamant when it came to doing homework in high school.

"When I would get home from school, and after we had finished dinner, we had to grab our books and we couldn't leave the table until our homework was done," Sklenar said. "That kind of discipline has stayed with me. I've never had any problem keeping up with my studies. It's just something you have to do."

"There are times you have to sacrifice things, like going out with friends or watching television, but it's really worth it," Egnatuk added. "Don't get me wrong, I'm not a workaholic, but I feel like I'm wasting a day if I'm just sitting around doing nothing."

DeBoer says balancing the load between football practice and a full schedule of classes can be difficult at times.

"It makes for a long day. You're on the football field four or five hours a day, plus meetings and weight training a couple times a week," DeBoer said. "That can be rough. But the coaching staff has always expressed scholastics above football. You just have to keep reminding yourself of that."

"Football demands such a great deal of their time that their success academically is even more impressive," said Deromedi. "All three have come through our program and really distinguished themselves."

Deromedi is quick to point out the parallel between athletic and academic success.

"Look what they have done here. They have been able to utilize their intelligence and I'm sure it has made them better football players," Deromedi said. "They came to Central with great football sense. You can't teach that."

DeBoer said when he arrived at Central, he hoped to maintain a B average, at best.

"I always had good grades in high school but they were nothing spectacular," DeBoer said. "But when I received a 3.5 after my first semester, I realized I could do good work here. I've just tried to maintain it all along."

Although their academic prowess is something to be proud of, each believes it has been tarnished, somewhat, by behind-the-back comments from non-believers.

"I've heard it all. It's the old 'football player getting a break story,'" said Egnatuk. "That kind of talk really burns me. I wish they knew just how hard I have had to work at this. I've earned my grades."

POINTS AFTER

1985 MAC PREVIEW

According to almost every pre-season football poll available, the real race in the Mid-American Conference (MAC) is for second place.

The Bowling Green State University Falcons and crack quarterback Brian McClure are an overwhelming choice everywhere you look to win the MAC crown and return to the California Bowl.

However, the fly in the ointment as far as the rest of the conference is concerned is that the favorite has not won the crown in 11 years. And, that's what teams like Central Michigan, Northern Illinois, Miami and Toledo are banking on as the 1985 campaign gets going.

The Chippewas and veteran coach Herb Deromedi will be the first to attest to the fact that the favorites don't always win. CMU was the pick of the MAC media in 1984 but finished in third place with a 6-2-1 mark.

"Bowling Green has an outstanding team and should be the team to beat," said Deromedi. "But, there are some other good teams in the MAC this year that could make it interesting."

The Falcons of Coach Denny Stolz received 61 of 65 first place votes at the annual Football Preview in mid-summer, and finished with 645 points. Central Michigan was second with 531 points followed by defending champion Toledo at 515, Miami 431 and Northern Illinois 357. The rest of the MAC was as follows: Western Michigan 321, Kent State 233, Ohio University 211, Eastern Michigan 190 and Ball State 141.

Following is a team-by-team thumbnail sketch of the MAC:
BOWLING GREEN — McClure, the 6-7 senior quarterback, is being billed as a Heisman Trophy candidate, and his stats certainly warrant a look. He entered the season with 7,606 yards in career passing — nearly 500 more yards than Boston College's Doug Flutie carried into his senior season when he broke the NCAA mark of 10,579 career yards.

"He's certainly one of the great players ever to play in the MAC, and at the end of the season he might be considered one of the greats in college football," said Stolz.

The Falcons have much more than just a passing attack. Eight of 11 starters return on defense including all-MAC corner Melvin Marshall. Split end Stan Hunter was all-MAC in 1984 along with tailback Bernard White and McClure on offense. White rushed for 1,078 yards and caught 56 passes for 400 yards. Hunter caught 52 for 744 yards.

CENTRAL MICHIGAN — Deromedi said he was a bit surprised being picked No. 2, but felt the voters did it because of tradition as much as anything.

"We lost a number of outstanding football players but we have some very good ones returning," he said. "It promises to be one of the more challenging seasons in memory. We will be very young."

Junior quarterback Ron Fillmore has recovered from knee surgery and is ready to lead the offense along with Academic All-American John DeBoer at split end (40 catches for 831 yards and nine TDs). Three starters are back on the offensive line in 6-6, 280-pound tackle Brian Williams, 6-3, 245-pound guard Rick Poljan and 6-3, 245-pound center Mike Brunner.

A pair of outstanding linebackers in seniors Kevin Egnatuk and Steve Sklenar anchor the defense along with safety Tony Elliott and cornerback Carl Kloosterman.

CMU's kicking game, a problem area last season, should be greatly improved.

Central Michigan will pin its hopes on senior Tony Brown to fill the void at tailback caused by the graduation of Curtis Adams, now performing with the San Diego Chargers of the NFL.

TOLEDO — A strong defense that must keep the Rockets in the contest is the key for Coach Dan Simrell's charges as they try to defend their crown. Eight of 11 starters are back on defense led by 6-4, 271-pound tackle Brent Williams and 6-4, 214-pound end Bob Beemer. The kicking game will be a question mark as will the offensive line. Junior A. J. Sager is a proven quantity at QB having passed for 1,510 yards in '84.

MIAMI — They're saying the "Magic is Back" at Miami this year after two straight 4-7 seasons — virtually unheard of at tradition-rich Miami. A solid kicking game and an improved defense are the keys because the Redskins of Coach Tim Rose return nine regulars on offense. Tops is tailback George Swarn who gained 1,282 yards in '84. The QB will be Al Marlow, who hit on 39 of 66 passes in 1984 for 416 yards as a reserve.

NORTHERN ILLINOIS — Impressive in the '85 opener (a 17-0 win over Western Michigan), the Huskies could be the sleeper in the MAC this season under new coach Jerry Pettibone. The defense is outstanding, especially the line where 6-3, 263-pound Scott Kellar and 6-2, 236-pound Doug Bartlett hang out. Depth and offensive production is a concern although 6-3, 285-pound tackle Todd Peat is not. Frosh Marshall Taylor of Detroit won the QB job.

WESTERN MICHIGAN — The Broncos have a number of talented players in linebacker John Offerdahl, 6-6, 255-pound defensive lineman Mark Garalczyk, safety Ken Luckett and up-back Kelly Spielmaker. But, a questionable kicking game could hurt. Seven starters are back on offense and eight on defense. Coach Jack Harbaugh says WMU has its best depth since 1982 although a tough early-season schedule may slow progress.

KENT STATE — Another team that may make waves this season under third-year coach Dick Scesniak. Golden Flashes won one game in 1983 and four in '84. Defensive line and line-backing are areas of strength. Tailback Derrick Nix gained 720 yards rushing in '84 while 6-3, 250-pound tackle Lee Bullington is tough on defense.

OHIO UNIVERSITY — Former Bobcat quarterback standout Cleve Bryant hopes to lead Ohio football back to the top as its new head coach. Defense will be a main area of concern as nine starters return on offense. QB Dennis Swearington passed for 1,211 yards last fall, and OU will definitely try the air this season. Defensive tackle Sherman Carter (6-1, 245) is talented.

EASTERN MICHIGAN — Buoyed by a season-opening 27-22 win over Youngstown State, Coach Jim Harkema hopes to lead the Hurons out of the lower division of the MAC. Talent at skill-positions may help make up for the lack of "blue collar" players in the trenches. The play of QB Robert Gordon is an offensive key. Tailback Gary Patton is a slashing sophomore who picked up 566 yards a year ago. EMU feels its kicking combo of placekicker Mario Ferretti and punter Bob Hirschmann is the best in the MAC.

BALL STATE — First-year coach Paul Schudel had a rough MAC debut when Bowling Green posted a 31-6 victory. Eight starters are back on offense and defense. QB Neil Britt hit for 1,205 yards last year and tailback Burt Austin rushed for 551 yards. Linebacker Brad Saar is one of the MAC's best.

Sklenar earned a spot on the all-MAC squad based on his 56 total tackles and heady play.

Sklenar, who's brother Joe is a backup outside linebacker for the Chippewas and also an excellent student, hopes he can be an inspiration for other athletes.

"Not many athletes are going to have football or whatever after college so that grade-point-average counts," said Sklenar. "The stereotype that we get nothing but breaks in class is very far from the truth. If they want to believe it, let them. That's their problem."

"I don't think anybody has to cheat to get a good grade," he added.

And after college is over? Egnatuk says he would like to work for a brokerage firm as a financial consultant. DeBoer and Sklenar have each accepted positions with Price Waterhouse Co., the nation's largest accounting firm. DeBoer will work out of the Detroit office and Sklenar in Toledo, Ohio.

"Football has been great and so has going to school at Central," Sklenar said. "It's been the greatest experience of my life. Now it's time to make a mark on the outside world."

Each will leave an even bigger one behind.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Central led the MAC with four players on the all-Academic team last year including John DeBoer, Steve Sklenar, current starting tight end Bob Stebbins and graduated swing back Ted Hollern. Since 1975, the Chippewas have earned 27 spots on the MAC all-Academic team (including 12 the last three years) and have had 11 gain All-American status.




DeBoer (#87) with Ron Fillmore, #4 and Rick Poljan, #71 had plenty to celebrate last year in his record-setting season.
