Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) are "all types of abuse, neglect, and other potentially traumatic experiences that occur to people under the age of 18." (Center for Disease Control).

ACE's are strongly associated with health risk behaviors and poor health outcomes.

CMU's podcast series responds to a critical need for mitigating the prevalence and impacts of ACEs and provides information, strategies, and resources for medical professionals.

Episodes discuss the expanding evidence across fields of neuroscience, genetics and epidemiology and spotlight the dramatic links between adverse childhood experiences, stunted physiological development, risky behavior, psychological issues, serious illnesses and the leading causes of death. Information on how trauma impacts the developing brain, how children can be impacted and protected, factors influencing the variable response to adversity and the challenges of preventing and recognizing the effect of trauma on children are explored.

• 2/3 of Michigan adults reported having one or more ACEs in 2016

- Heart disease and other illnesses
