ENS 101QR (includes lab which satisfies UP group II-B lab requirement)	Of Earth and Us: Introduction to Environmental Science	Explore environmental systems through examination of major issues facing humanity today. HST 110	The American Experience	Thematic survey of American history. Possible topics include: changing concepts of American democracy, the role of the frontier, immigration, labor and business in America. *May be offered as Writing Intensive.	Brittany Fremion
HST 112	The Struggle for Equality: The United States, 1865-Present	A broad interpretive study of the United States since the Civil War. *May be offered as Writing Intensive.	Kathy Donohue or Brittany Fremion
HST 120	Unlikely Princesses: Women of World History	An examination of "dangerous" women in world history who would not make good cartoon princesses. *May be offered as Writing Intensive.	Brittany Fremion
