
TWO-WEEK STUDY ABROAD (June 20-July 7)

HST 397 Americans in Paris (3 credits)

- Spend two weeks exploring Paris with excursions to Versailles, Normandy and Giverny.
- Immerse yourself in three centuries of French history, literature, and culture as seen through the eyes of generations of Americans who called Paris home.
- Satisfy your I-A* Gen Ed requirement.
- Apply for scholarships available from History, CLASS and Study Abroad.



Since the American War of Independence, France and the United States have been engaged in a unique cultural and political dialogue. We will examine several key moments of this history by walking in the footsteps of famous and not-so-famous famous Americans, who at different times called Paris home.

Join us as we visit some of the city's most iconic sites: the Champs Elysées, the Eiffel Tower, the Moulin Rouge, the art district of Montmartre, the student quarter around the Sorbonne University and the Montparnasse quarter, home of the interwar Lost Generation. We will spend many hours at the Louvre and other major museums. We will walk the beaches of Normandy. And we will travel to Giverny, where we will see Monet's garden up-close. All the while, we will compare our experience of Paris with the experience of those Americans who made the trip before us. Why were so many Americans drawn to Paris? What did they learn from their interaction with Parisian society and culture? What values did they bring home with them? Did their experience of Paris make a difference in American society or politics? The only way to find the answers is to go to Paris.
