Are you CONFIDENT that your ideas are your own, OR that they are so obviously common knowledge (e.g. the earth is round) that there was no more need to cite sources?

Did you give credit to ALL original authors for any ideas you summarized or paraphrased, even if you completely changed the wording?

Even if you didn't mean to plagiarize or weren't familiar with all the plagiarism standards, you can be held accountable. Lack of understanding or intent does not free you from serious penalty. View academic consequences for Academic Integrity violations.

OR if you have used another's ideas to elaborate on or validate your own, but you cite the original author/artist (and you provide their name and all pertinent information so the reader could locate the original).
