General Notes

- **It is strongly recommended that transfer students contact CMU early in their college career to ensure proper course sequencing for their major, optimizing course scheduling, and timely degree completion at CMU. CMU College of Education & Human Services 989.774.3309.**
- A grade of C- or better is required for a course to transfer.
- A bachelor’s degree at CMU requires a minimum of 120 semester hours of credit. Some majors or degrees will require more. CMU will accept community college transfer credits beyond the recommended 60 - 62 semester hours; however students will need to complete a minimum of 60 semester hours from an accredited 4-year-degree granting institution. A minimum of 30 semester hours of credit must be earned from CMU. A minimum of 40 hours must be completed at the 300 level or above.
- The University Program Requirements and competencies, other than Writing Intensive competencies, may be fulfilled by students who satisfy the MTA
- **Students are required to meet the following CMU Competency Requirements with a “C” or above prior to reaching 56 credit hours: two Written English (composition) courses, one Oral English (communication) course, and one Mathematics..**

Any remaining required and elective courses for a bachelor’s degree will be selected in consultation with an academic advisor to ensure that CMU degree requirements are being met.

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MAJOR/MINOR COURSES: These courses should be selected from transferable **Wayne County Community College District** courses to apply to CMU major/minor options. See Bachelor of Science in Education—Secondary Standard Certificate. Students intending to major or minor in Mathematics should review the CMU Bulletin to identify prerequisite courses that can be completed prior to transfer.

Completion of this degree will qualify a student for recommendation to the Michigan State Board of Education for a Secondary Standard Certificate, which will permit the holder to teach the major and minor in the secondary grades.

Majors in School Health Education (HSC) and Physical Education (PES) will qualify for recommendation for a Secondary Standard Certificate, permitting the holder to teach the major in grades K-12 and an additional minor in grades 6-12

Visual Arts Education (ART) will qualify for recommendation for a Secondary Standard Certificate, permitting the holder to teach the major in grades K-12, and no minor is required.

Majors in Special Education (SPE) will qualify for recommendation for a Secondary Standard Certificate, permitting the holder to teach students with emotional or cognitive impairment in grades K-12 and additional subjects based on second major or minor selections. Early advisement is critical to understanding Highly Qualified requirements.
